### SAVING THE SEED CORN

For years we have been advised to save the seed corn early. This year it looks as if we would be lucky to save it all, especially in the northern part of the corn belt, declares the Prairie Farmer, which goes on, unless we want to take our chances with roasting ears. The best we can do is to pray for a late frost, and when the corn does begin to ripen, gather in the early maturing ears as carefully as a hen gathers her chicks at the approach of an impending thunder shower. Unless we have an extremely late frost, seed corn fit to plant in the northern portion of the corn belt will be hard to get at any price next spring.

### GERMAN FOOD TRUST OFFERS CONTRACT TO U. S. CONCERNS.

BERLIN, via London, Oct. 15.—Three representatives of big American food concerns today called on James W. Gerald, the American ambassador, and laid before him a new proposition in an attempt to secure the importation of supplies from the United States.

They claimed that a huge, newly formed concern, "The East Prussian Food Company" had offered them almost unlimited contracts for food if they could import them, the supplies by agreement to be used exclusively for the suffering civil population of the Russian territory occupied by Germany. Since the importation would only be possible if some arrangement were reached through diplomatic channels, they requested the ambassador to take the necessary steps.

Mr. Gerald told the representatives that it would not, in his opinion, be possible to make any such arrangement with the German government, but as no agreement had yet been reached, the German government cancelled the original agreement.

A London despatch early in July said that the German government had cancelled an agreement which permitted the Rockefeller Foundations War Relief Committee to take charge of the work of feeding the civilian population of Poland. Members of the commission had secured an agreement with the German government for its aid in financing the plan if permission were secured from the Entente Allies to import the necessary food supplies. Negotiations to that end with Russia failed. Then the British foreign office was approached, but as no agreement had yet been reached, the German government cancelled the original agreement.

**SONUSES FOR POSTAL WORKERS**

LONDON, Oct. 16.—Additional remuneration, the postmaster-general announces, will be paid as from March 1st to certain specified classes of employees of the post office. The increases range from 3s per week downward, as the original wage of the workers increases, thus benefitting the lower-paid employees most. The classes affected include part time workers and females; the latter, however, only receive half the increase that males receive. Temporary workers are also included in the scheme, as well as those serving with the colors.
