

Rudy Horvath No. 1 Canadian Amateur Golfer

MONTREAL, March 4 (CP)—Rudy Horvath, the swarthy, tough little insurance man from Windsor, Ont., heads the list of 1948 national amateur golf rankings released today by Hillis Pickens, Jr., in his 13th annual ratings, appearing in the current issue of Canadian Sport Monthly. Pickens gave the nod to Horvath over Bill Etnick, the hockey-playing golfer who bowed to the renowned Frank Trahanah of Toledo in last year's Canadian amateur at Quebec.

Release of the new rankings coincided with the annual meeting in Montreal of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, which gives its benevolent blessings to Pickens' selections.

Ed Crowell of Halifax, winner of the Nova Scotia and Maritime amateur titles placed 15th. Henry Martell, Edmonton policeman and former champion who lost his title last summer, was ranked with Guy Rolland of Laval-sur-Le-Lac, Que., for third spot.

In fifth spot, behind the Rolland-Martell joint ownership of third, is Alan Boes of Winnipeg who went to the quarter-finals of the amateur and lost to Rolland almost squaring the match at the 18th. Boes, a stocky veteran of 86, had low individual score in the Willingdon Cup matches.

The veteran Jack Nash of London, finalist in the Ontario amateur last summer and a former champion, was ranked sixth. Hugh Morrison, the long-hitting Vancouver player, was placed seventh. He is the British Columbia champion.

Hal Eldsvig of Winnipeg was ranked eighth on the strength of winning the 1947 Manitoba open and amateur, his steady Willingdon Cup player and his efforts in the Canadian amateur where he, too, reached the 16's.

Phil Farley, veteran tournament player and former Ontario champion, took ninth spot. Behind him, in 10th place, was ranked young Gerry Kesseling, Canadian junior champion who placed third in the Ontario open.

Election Deposit Fees Boosted In Legislature By 400 Per Cent

Bills raising the deposit fees of provincial election candidates from \$50 to \$200, remunerating grand and petit jurors at the rate of \$5.00 per day, lightening up highway traffic regulations and providing for the appointment of a Deputy Attorney General were given second reading in the Legislative Assembly yesterday.

Loads Too Heavy

In reply to a question by Mr. Kitchham, Premier Jones said he had no further word respecting the refrigerator car shortage. Mr. Saville referred to a despatch in The Guardian to the effect that a packing house strike was to be called in the United States. "I understand that the Union here belongs to the same brotherhood, the C. I. O.," he said, "and I think the controller of the local packing house might give us some information as to what would happen in the case of that strike taking place, whether or not the packing house here would continue in operation as it has been for some time. I think it would be a good thing for the public to know this in advance. If the farmers got scared as they did last fall it might start a stampede of hog shipping here. I would like to hear the controller, or the Premier, or the Minister of Agriculture make an explanation."

Hon. Mr. Stewart: "In the absence of the controller (Hon. Mr. Wright) I may say that my understanding is that it is being operated under his control and supervision and that they cannot strike against the Government at any time."

Mr. D. L. Mathieson asked if answers had been prepared with respect to Question 41, dealing with the correspondence between Canada Packers Ltd. and the Government about the duties performed, Crapaud Heart Breakers which ended in a tie 1-1. Mr. Ramsay presented a petition from Charles A. Gordon and others for an Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Garage Operators' Association. A bill in accordance with the petition was received and read.

Premier Jones introduced an Act to amend the Teachers' Superannuation Act.

Hon. Mr. Large introduced an Act to provide for regulation of the distribution of electric energy and telephone service in Prince Edward Island; also an Act to amend the Land Assessment Act, 1924, and the Public Vehicle Act.

The following bills were read a third time and passed: An Act to amend the Vital Statistics Act; an Act to amend an Act to suspend temporarily the imposition of Income Taxes, Succession Duties and certain Corporation Taxes; an Act to amend the Trustee Act.

Defamation Act

On motion of Premier Jones the House went into committee with Mr. Delaney in the chair on the second reading of an Act to make uniform the law respecting Defamation. The promoter explained that the bill was in line with uniform legislation in other Provinces. It has the effect of placing in statutory form much of the Common Law respecting defamation. It also is a modern bill in that it deals with broadcasting as well as newspapers and public meetings.

Mr. Saville expressed the hope that it was not proposed to interfere in any way with the freedom of the Press. "That is something that should be very carefully safeguarded," he said, "because I believe that the Press is one of the most important institutions in the country. Newspapers have done a great work and I have no doubt the promoter has no intention of doing anything that would curtail their freedom."

The bill defines "defamation" as meaning "libel or slander." No reply was vouchsafed to Mr. Saville when he asked if anyone could inform him what "libel" meant.

Bill reported agreed to with minor amendment.

HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT

Hon. Mr. Barbour moved the House into committee with Mr. J. G. Campbell in the chair on an Act to amend the Highway Traffic Act.

The bill provides "among other things for registration of non-resident car owners if they remain here longer than three months; for registration within ten days of motor vehicles purchased outside the Province; for an examiner's certificate before an operator's license shall be issued to an applicant suffering from some apparent physical disability of such a nature as might impair his driving efficiency. It prohibits motor vehicle operators from carrying loads in excess of that for which their permit is issued, also the moving of buildings on any highway without a permit from the Public Works Minister, and the parking of cars, except when disabled, upon the travelled portion of a highway outside of a city or town, or where a clear view of the vehicle cannot be obtained from a distance of 300 feet in each direction. The bill also prohibits drivers of bicycles and motor-cycles from carrying on any person from carrying any other person thereon. It provides for the prompt reporting of car acci-

Across Canada preparations are under way for Boy Scout Leaders' Summer Training Camps. Definite dates by provinces are announced by E. F. Mills, Executive Commissioner for Training at Dominion Scout Headquarters as follows:

British Columbia, Scoutmasters' Course at Lake Osprey, July 1 to 10; Cubmasters' Course at Camp Byng, Aug. 21 to 28; Patrol Protectors, Scoutmasters at Gimli, July 24 to August 2; Cubmasters at Gimli, August 9 to 14.

Ontario, Cubmasters, at Blue Springs, July 17 to 24 and at Sudbury, July 12 to 18; Scoutmasters at Blue Springs, July 24 to August 2; and at Blue Springs again from Sept. 17 to 27.

Quebec, Scoutmasters, at Tamaraquete, Aug. 7 to 15, Maritime Provinces Scoutmasters at Camp Buchan, P. E. I., from July 13 to 23.

Well-drilling operations will start shortly on the site of the first Canadian Scouters' Training Centre near Pinhey Point, some 23 miles upstream from Ottawa on the Ottawa River, Ontario side.

Jurors' Fees

It was reported agreed to after an amendment, moved by Mr. Bell, had been adopted raising the petit jurors' fee to \$5.00.

ELECTION ACT

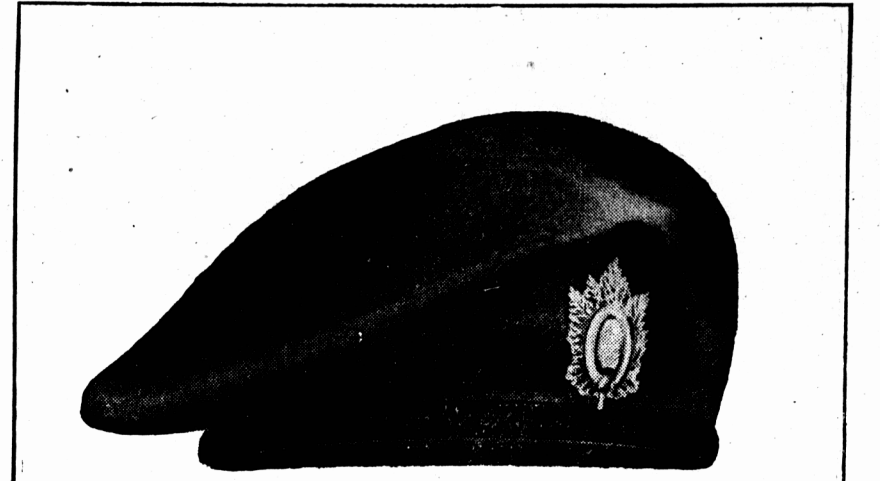
Hon. Mr. Large moved the House into committee with Mr. McLean in the chair on an Act to amend the Election Act. The bill increases the required deposit for nomination of candidates in provincial elections from \$50 to \$200.

The promoter referred to the expense of elections and said the change would be in line with the deposits required in some of the other Provinces.

The increase to \$200 was objected to by Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Mr. Bell and Mr. D. L. Mathieson as being unreasonably high.

Premier Jones said he believed there should be some provision for making people get out and vote. Elections cost a lot of money and those who stay home without adequate excuse should be fined perhaps two dollars. He was giving his own private view, he emphasized.

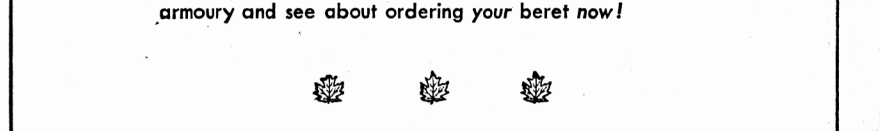
