EXTRADITION CASE—The extradition case against Mr. Major Clark was continued yesterday at 2 p. m. before His Honour Judge Inman in the court house at Summerside. The prosecution concluded their case and the attorney for the defendant took exception to the fact that the American indictment charged desertion of both wife and minor child, whilst the extradition treaty provides for only desertion of minor child and not the wife and that the two could not be joined in extradition proceedings. The case was further adjourned until 10 o'clock this morning when further argument of counsel will be heard.

PRISONERS DISCHARGED—In the police court at Summerside yesterday two young men, McDougall and McDonald appeared on a preliminary enquiry, before Stipendiary Wyatt charged with having in their possession stolen goods, being the property of Mr. J.
