PLEET HORSES IN THE MARITIME CIRCUIT.

Miss Eliza Ritchie, who is in charge of the Art Department at the Exhibition, says that the display of fine arts in the Art Gallery will surpass in beauty and value any of its predecessors.
The fisheries exhibit will be enlarged and made more comprehensive. It will include a great variety of strange live fishes brought up by the trawlers. This will be something absolutely new for the P.E.I. that opens at Halifax on September 2nd.

Some months ago it was given out that Premier Clemeau of France had resolved to abolish capital punishment in France. A reaction against the movement at once set in. After a time a Paris paper took a plebiscite of its readers on the subject with the result of over a million majority in favor of continuing to execute the worst class of criminals. President Fallieres had just granted a pardon to one whom the Paris populace thought deserved to die. This roused them to fever heat and so the guillotine will be retained.
In the United States there is a reaction in favor of capital punishment in several of the seven States that had abolished it. Colorado and Iowa have already restored it. Maine, Michigan, Wisconsin, Rhode Island and Kansas are the remaining States that have no death penalty. Forty-one of the forty-six States have capital punishment.
In Italy there is no death penalty, but most European countries retain it. As to the method of executing criminals: the guillotine is employed publicly in France, Belgium, Denmark and in two cantons of Switzerland, and privately in Bavaria, Saxony and part of Switzerland. The gallows is publicly used in Austria, Portugal and Russia, and privately in Britain and the British colonies and the United States, except in New York and New Jersey, where the electric chair is used. Death by the sword obtains in part of Switzerland, and in China publicly, in Russia privately. In Spain death is inflicted by the garrote, and in Hesse by the axe, both publicly. Some South American countries execute criminals by shooting.

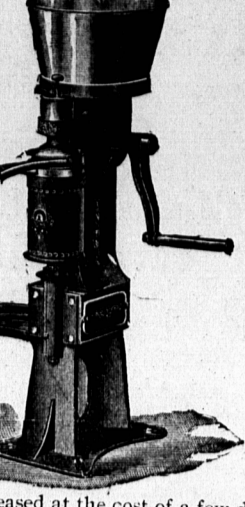
