Navy Surge From Behind In Last Two Periods To Earn Draw With Jr. Royals

Outscoring their opponents 5-2 in the last two periods of the game, and outplaying them at the same time, Navy last night forced another game in the Commercial Hockey League championship series by playing their second successive tie with the Junior Royals, the encounter ending 6-6. Result of last night's game left the Royals with the only win of the series with the last two games falling to decide a winner.

A scoring burst in the first period that netted them four counters to their opponents' one sent the Royals away to a commanding lead in the first twenty minutes of the game but after that the Navy took over the driver's seat as they outscored their opponents 2-1 in the middle game and then deadlocked the score with a 3-1 edge in the final chukker.

Sensational goal-tending by Earl Boates in the Juniors cage particularly in the second session, as he kicked out a ton of rubber plus the playmaking of Bucko Trainor in the first period were the deciding factors that gave the Juniors the draw. From the second period on Navy continually carried the play to their opponents with a fast, hard-driving game that slowly but surely whittled down the lead and enabled them to score three goals in the space of five minutes in the final session to earn their draw.

Settling down to work right from the start, Royals took only two minutes and 40 seconds to score the opening goal as Bucko Trainor forced into the boards got a pass-out to McLeod with the centerman striking from fifteen feet out. Navy, firing away tied the count less than two minutes later as Ev. Jay slipped a short forward pass to Wil Whalen and the latter, from the open corner positioned with a sharply angled shot. The tie score was in existence only the matter of two minutes and 39 seconds however when Charlie Deighan stuck his stick inside the Navy defence mapped a low drive that beat McInnis, cleanly. More than seven minutes later with the Royals controlling the play P. Roach picked up his spot, calmly from McInnis doorstep and the Royals led 3-1. Roach's goals came on a pass from Trainor. One second before the sell Trainor took a pass from McLeod and the last shot just beat the time keepers bell to give the Juniors a 4-1 lead.

Coming out for the second period Navy began controlling the play but were kept off the score sheet by the fast moving Boates. Over half the period had elapsed before the scoring began and it was the Royals that opened it McLeod taking passes from J. Roach and P. Roach for 5-1 lead. Jack Darrach a minute and 34 seconds later with Royals playing two men short and Navy one poked the puck away from a Royal player inside the defence and had Boates at his mercy. Less than four minutes later as Navy ganged Worth took Jay's pass to take the score

read 5-3 at the bell. Again in the third period Royals, despite their performance seemed headed for a victory as Trainor gave them a 6-3 lead 10 minutes and 42 seconds after on a pass from McLeod but the Navy's untiring efforts bore fruit in the final seven minutes of the game as they shot three goals without a return to deadlock the count. Jack Darrach got the first as he took Lawlor's pass at the goalmouth at 13:07; two minutes and 53 seconds later Lawlor slammed in Darrach's rebound and Ev. Jay got the tying counter at 18:20 of the period slamming the disc home from a mixup in front of the Royals cage.

That they were soundly outplayed from the start of the second period was quite evident to every fan in attendance and it was a good thing that it wasn't a junior playdown game they were taking part in.

They bore about as much resemblance to a junior championship team as a snowball does to a hotdog. Alternately hot and cold—mostly cold—the Juniors after a scoring burst in the first period seemed content to let it go at that and wound up by finding out that a hockey game is never decided in one period.

That their performance was disappointing would be putting it mildly. Gone was the speed that they are capable of unleashing; missing were the fine passing attacks that, as so much a part of their game; in fact everything in the way of a smart team they possess was conspicuous by its absence and far between to display even the fight that so often before has brought them through so many tough spots.

Any team can have an off night in which plays just won't click no matter how hard they try but from this observer's view the Juniors last night weren't trying overly hard, at least that is the great majority of them. They seemed to get into a groove in the last periods that they had better not repeat. They just did manage to shake themselves out a little and usually they scored goals but the inspired moments were few and far between and it is lucky they didn't end up behind the eight ball.

For a team just one week away from the beginning of the defence of their Maritime title it was indeed a bad showing and one that they had better not repeat. The lesson that they are to survive the first round. They have a lot of "slack" to pull in before Wednesday night rolls around and they had better get busy not tomorrow or the next day but right away.

There is no doubt but that they possess the ability. They have shown that many times in the past and that is why last night's performance ranks so much. But in this game has taught them the lesson that no matter how much they are ahead they can't afford to underestimate their opponents.

It is an old saying and a true one that a game is never over until the final whistle and Royals should never get by playing that kind of hockey and it is our sincere hope that the Royals, possessing the ability they do, will on their next appearance prove that they can look just as good as they looked last night.

And the above is not meant to take anything away from the tie that the Navy team earned to the fullest extent and were only kept from a victory by the goal-tending of young Boates.

Any team that has the courage and fight to come from behind a three goal lead deserves the highest commendation and Navy's performance last night put an altogether different outlook on the ultimate outcome of the series.

Playing a fast, driving game from start to finish the "Tars" last night had a decided edge on their opponents in the last two periods of the game and only superlative goaling plus their own overcautiousness around the nets kept them from evening the series at a win and a draw apiece. And at that they played the game minus the services of Eddie Darrach their hardworking, and high scoring defenceman.

However Saturday night is another game and "Tars" imbued by the confidence they must have gained from last night's battle should be an even bet to prolong the series to a fifth game.
