United States

As an alternative if Britain refuses to remain in Palestine, it is understood Pearson advanced another suggestion which would turn the problem over to the Security Council.

To do this, under the United Nations charter, it would be necessary for the Security Council to declare that the situation in Palestine was a "threat to the peace."

The Security Council could act and presumably could call on the United Nations Agency for Palestine and the Arab Higher Committee to see that governments were established in both new countries to take over when the British withdrew.

The private conference came a few hours after L. B. Pearson of Canada said in a lengthy statement to the Dominion's views on the toughly Palestine problem that "there is danger that events will over-reach us, that we will be unable to take effective action in time and that confusion and disorder will follow upon the withdrawal of Britain, the mandatory power."

The informal sub-committee of the U.S., Russia and the United States agreed to participate in a four-power working group of a sub-committee of the United Nations Assembly, 17-member special Palestine committee.

Venezuela and Canada had suggested that a committee composed of the U.S., Russia and Guatemala get together privately in an effort to reconcile American and Russian views on the partition of Palestine into sovereign Arab and Jewish states.

Other U. N. developments: 1. The Soviet bloc charged in the 57-member Political Committee that the United States is attempting to "piggy-back" the issue of Korean independence and "white-wash" its conduct in the southern zone now occupied by American troops.

2. The Political Committee sub-group which is drawing up a chart for the year-round sitting of the Assembly completed its work. Russia and Czechoslovakia maintained their boycott of this "little assembly" body throughout its meetings. The sub-committee now goes back to the full group with its report.

Nowhere across the country were there any advance hints that trends might develop which political pulse feelers could use in figuring possibilities for the 1948 presidential election. But Republicans in Kentucky and Indiana did use the Hart-Whitely labor law as campaign material.

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Memoirs Praise Winston Churchill

BOSTON, Nov. 4 — (AP) — Memoirs of John Gilbert Winant contain praise of Winston Churchill, Britain's wartime prime minister, saying "in our time he has fought to defend the rights of man."

The story is told in "Letter From Grosvenor Square," a book just completed by the former United States ambassador to London, who shot and killed himself last night. The publishers (Houghton Mifflin Co.) said the book would be out Nov. 18.

The memoirs say the late President Roosevelt displayed "cold anger" when Winant told him late in 1938 it was his duty to run for a third term.

\$50,000 Damages Case At Halifax

HALIFAX, Nov. 4 — (CP) — Toy plastic automobiles were used in Supreme Court today to illustrate the circumstances of a traffic accident on which Harry Rhude, 23-year-old R.C.A.F. veteran, has based an action for more than \$50,000 damages for injuries he may "sue for."

Rhude, a D.F.C. winner and law student, was injured a year ago when a jeep driven by Peter Gordon, his host, collided with a car driven by Dr. Kenneth B. Grant. The veteran, a passenger in the jeep, is suing Gordon and Dr. Grant for general damages of \$50,000 plus special damages of \$1,522.05.

Mr. Justice John Doull adjourned the case until tomorrow to hear argument of counsel.

N. S. Youth Tells Story Of Shooting

(By The Canadian Press) WINDSOR, N. S., Nov. 4 — Raymond Turpie, 17, testified at a coroner's inquest today into the death Oct. 28 of Maurice Mason by a bullet fired from a .22-caliber 12-year-old boy with a slingshot.

The jury, which found that Mason died of a wound from a gun in Turpie's hands, recommended that regulations applying to use of fire-arms, especially on Sunday, be more strictly enforced. Police said no charges had been laid against Turpie.

The youth told the inquest he had been hunting when he met young Turpie "fooling around under an apple tree with a slingshot."

"We went along through the apple trees," Turpie said, "and I told him to stop behind me because the gun was loaded. He 'looked all around' and I told him to come back, but he turned around as if he was going to."

"I tripped, and tried to save the gun from going off. But it went off. I don't remember what happened after that because I lost my head."

Thomas Mason told of finding his son's body under a clump of bushes. R.C.M.P. Sgt. Alex Campbell said Turpie had told him after the shooting of Mason he had "looked all around for a while and then I started to drag him away."

Find Wreckage Of United States Bomber

(By The Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 4 — The wreckage of a United States bomber and the bones of its crew members were found on Newfoundland's east coast today by a search crew investigating a report that two hunters had found the wreckage of a plane.

Identification disks were found in the wreckage but American officials here did not disclose the names of the crew members or when the plane had been lost. James Lane, M. Bruce and R. Hickey discovered the plane's wreckage while hunting in the Gaff Topsail district.

Some officials here expressed the belief that the plane lost during war years.

Grew Rescued From Schooner

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 — (AP) — Crew members of the United States Army transport Charles A. Stafford made two trips in a tossing lifeboat today to rescue an entire crew of 31 from the Portuguese schooner Maria Carlota, sinking in mid-Atlantic from the battering of a storm.

Coast Guard headquarters here announced the rescue after it had received a message from the Stafford's master, Capt. Gunnar Van Housen.

The crew of the three-master Carlota, which had been en route to the fishing grounds off Newfoundland's Grand Banks, set fire to their vessel and left her to founder.

Coast Guard headquarters had dispatched air and sea rescue units to the scene, about 640 miles east-northeast of Argentina, Nfld. These were recalled. The liner Queen Elizabeth, which had altered her course to aid the schooner, proceeded toward Southampton.

The Queen Elizabeth was expected to reach Southampton 8 1/2 days morning, at least a half day late. Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada and Colonial Secretary Creech Jones of Britain, as well as many prominent industrialists and diplomats are on board.
