GUNNER BERT STEWART

Mrs. Rose Stewart, Southport, has been notified that her husband Gunner Bert Stewart, is officially reported admitted 2nd Australian General Hospital Wimereux Sept. 29th gun shot wound head, right arm, left leg. Gunner Bert Stewart was a member of the old 98 Siege Battery which left here in November of 1917 and has been on Active Service ever since. This is the first time he has been wounded it is hoped his wounds are not serious.

PTE. W. W. YOSTON

Mr. William H. Yoston received a telegram stating that his son Pte. W. Wollard Yoston in infantry was officially reported admitted to the 1st Australian General Hospital (Rouen) suffering from gunshot wound in the face. Pte. Yoston was only seventeen years and 10 months when he responded to his Country's call on Nov. 18th 1915. He crossed to England in July 1916 with the 105th Battalion. He then was transferred to the 104th then to the 13th reserve. He later crossed to France with a draft of the gallant fighting 26th and later transferred to the 78th Canadian Grenadiers in which Battalion he received his wound on Sept. 28th 1918. Pte. Yoston is three years on Active Service He also has another brother doing his bit for his King & country. His many friends and relations will hope it is not serious and wish him a speedy recovery.
