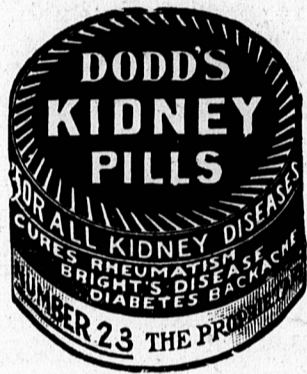
French River

### THE FERRYBOAT

#### MISS VANDERRURG

This handsome steamer which has been lying at Pownal Wharf for the past two or three days has been visited by many persons. The boat is the most up-to-date ferry boat which has entered the harbor. Her hull is of steel. She is 106 feet long, 20 feet, 9 inches beam, and draws only 5 1-2 feet of water. She has end and side entrances for teams and has three decks for the use of passengers. The passenger apartments are most perfectly equipped. The windows are arranged on the two lower decks like those in street cars and all can be let down in summer, making the decks practically open. The hurricane deck has no enclosures except the wheel house which has windows all around it. The boat is heated by steam, a special boiler being provided for the purpose. The "Miss Vandenburg" uses nothing but oil and smoke and smell alike unknown on board. Absolute cleanliness is thus possible. There are two oil engines. The oil is not burned, but is dropped on a hot ball where it explodes and forms a gas. The principle is the same as in acetlyne gas production. It is an experiment, but the fact that the steamer is in Charlottetown is a proof that it is a satisfactory motive agency. The best grade of oil is used. When the Miss Vandenburg left Wilmington she took on board 5,000 gallons of oil, sufficient for the trip.

The Miss Vandenburg has two engines, each about 90 h. p. She has two wheels in her wheel house and is the aid of the two engines and wheel she can be propelled sideways as well as ahead and backwards. The steamer has accommodation for 300 passengers and can carry more on excursions. The life boats are of metal and when filled with people and water will still float by reason of air tanks. The steamer was built at Wilmington this year at a cost of about \$50,000 for the service between Ogdensburg, New York, and Prescott, Ontario. She is named after the mother of the president of the ferry company.

OLD ORCHARD, Me., Aug. 9.—Early \$50,000 for missionary work as raised by Rev. A. B. 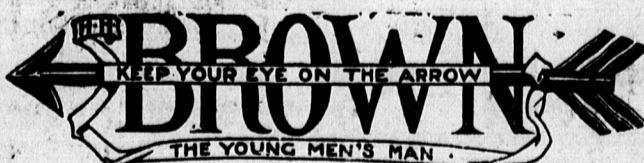

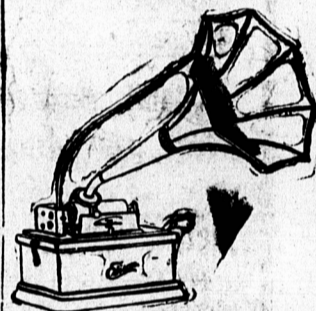
