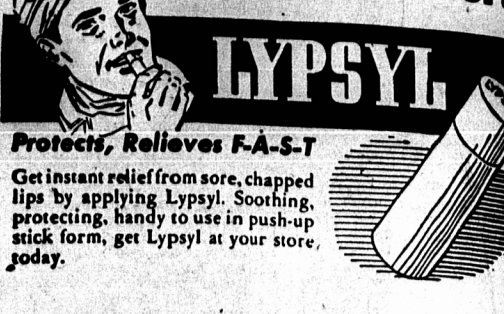

### MINE CLEARANCE HAZARDOUS WORK

GUERNSEY, Channel Islands, Sept. 12 — (CP) — During a 90-day program to clear 76,000 German mines from the coastal regions of Guernsey, four British troops and nine German prisoners of war were killed, and five British and 15 German soldiers were injured.

Since May 11 large numbers of British troops, helped by war prisoners have been engaged in reconstruction, and 96 per cent of the underwater obstacles around the coast have been rendered harmless, and 84 per cent of the anti-landing fortifications, such as large wooden stakes which were set up in the fields, have been removed.

One thousand of the 3,000 damaged houses in Guernsey have been restored along with 11 of the island's hotels.

### BRITAIN TRAINS POLICE CADETS

LONDON, Sept. 12 — (CP) — Boys who dream of becoming policemen may soon have their ambitions fulfilled for a scheme to train police cadets has been announced which it is hoped will solve the man-power shortage in the police force.

Under the scheme boys will be employed as clerks in the police administration in various cities and towns. They will be paid clerical rates and will wear uniform, but they will receive special training in police work and at the age of 20 become policemen.

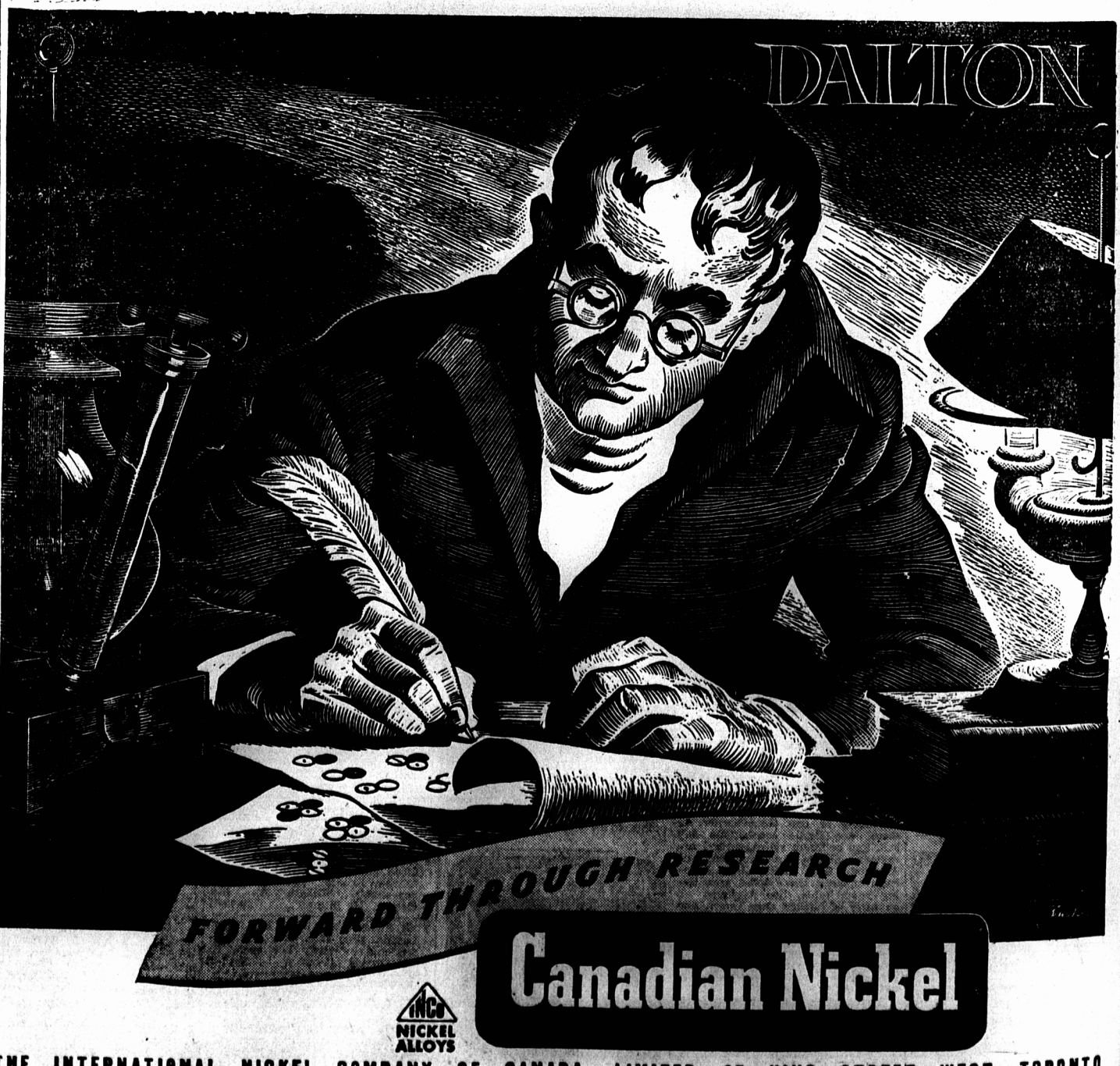
