**AROUND THE FOX RANCHES TO TALK OVER OCEAN NOW POSSIBLE**

Any impression that might have existed, that the fox industry, in common with others, would experience a slump in consequence of the war has been entirely dispelled, and the enquiries that have been reaching the various Exchanges throughout the city in regard to the fox business generally are abundant evidence of the continued stability of the industry and the interest which is being taken in it abroad. Not a day passes but some letter is received by one or other of the Fox Exchanges from persons interested in the States asking for prices of shares, etc. The agent in the United States of the Farm Stock and Fox Exchange reports a healthy interest existing there in Island stock.

Mr. W. F. H. Montgomery, fox rancher of Bedeque, has been in the city for the past two days in connection with some large fox deals. He has just completed the sale of seven pairs. He bought a beautiful male yesterday morning which he will take to Summerside with him. The female which was presented to the Prince County Hospital by B. I. Rayner a year ago and which was mated in the Park Island ranch with one of their best males was recently purchased by Mr. Montgomery, who was the highest out of a number of bidders. The acquisition is a splendid specimen. Mr. Montgomery says there is quite a demand for foxes and that he placed a number recently.

Ranchers in Summerside district are meeting with gratifying success in having their options taken up, and the ranches are now mating their foxes for the season's breeding. Barker's have just completed a splendid ranch at Summerside and will move their foxes into their new quarters in a few days. This ranch consisting of ten pens, guard pens, pens for cubs and hares, was constructed in the remarkably short space of 15 days, which reflects a good deal of credit on the manager, Mr. J. A. Lea.

In conversation with a Guardian reporter yesterday in regard to the state of the fox industry, a well-known foxman stated that there were a large number of enquiries for good foxes, quite a number of which have changed hands recently at fair prices. Altogether, he says, the industry seems to be in good, active condition. Asked what was the general state of health of the foxes, he stated that there was not a case of sickness that he knew of; in fact, that the foxes on the whole were never at any time in better condition. "With the expert knowledge that fox ranchers now possess," he said, "they find it an easy matter to keep their foxes in prime condition, which fact can be verified by an inspection of the ranches, whose stock in every single instance shows signs of having received the best attention. The young foxes (this year are far ahead of those of any previous year. They are larger and are well furred, taken altogether, and the ranchers are to be congratulated on the fact. The fur market is also improving and the war is creating a large demand for furs. The authorities have recently placed orders for fur coats for all officers (sheepskin coats being ordered for the men in the ranks) and this will mean the sale of a tremendous amount of furs."

Mr. and Mrs. John Holck, of Summerside, have just moved into their residence there. Mr. Holck is a native of Denmark and has travelled extensively. He is quite an interesting gentleman, and his experiences in various parts of the world in which he has resided at one time or another serve him in good stead. He speaks several languages fluently and is an entertaining companion. He has been in the Islands some months. While in Boston last June Mr. Holck learned of the fox business and came to Prince Edward Island in order thoroughly to investigate it on the spot. Having done so, he decided that where the fur farming industry was second to none, and he immediately purchased six pairs of Island foxes. Mr. Holck is a man of expert judgment and keen business acumen. He is a man of considerable means, having an independent and enviable income. He owns a newspaper in Denmark—a 24-page publication, which will no doubt from time to time furnish valuable information regarding the fox industry. Mr. Holck acquired his six pairs of foxes as a personal and independent purchase and not for the purpose of floating a company, as he believes there is "big" money to be made from the sale of pelts. Mr. Holck says he sees no reason why he should at all stay in the province permanently. Next year, in conjunction with his brother, he will build a ranch in Summerside for the foxes, which are being boarded at present. So far as any probable effect the war may have on furs goes, he is not concerned. He says he is firmly convinced that the fur business is yet in its infancy, since furs are a necessity and, for their systematic production, fur-farming is indispensable.

**ANNOUNCE NEW CABLE ADDRESS CONCESSION.**

LONDON, Oct. 26.—The Postmaster-General announces that the Army Council has now agreed to the use of registered addresses in extra European telegrams to and from this country, as from the 25th instant under the following conditions, the address must have been registered before July 1 last; it can only be used as address, its use as a signature is prohibited; telegrams having such addresses can only be sent to and received from British or allied territory in the extra European telegraph system, and in Egypt or the United States of America. In the case of telegrams to allied territory or the United States the full name and address of the addressee must be given on the back of the telegram form. It is understood also that where prepaid messages are handled to cable companies, and no reply will be refunded. This will mean a very substantial saving to users of cables, for since the war began the companies have refused to refund the cost in any such cases.
