There were twenty-five passengers to Georgetown by the Stanley Saturday.

Frank Murphy, Hope River, who is in the Charlottetown Hospital is steadily improving in health.

That Prince Edward Island once had the ballot, and that afterwards it was abandoned, argues nothing. The one question is whether the ballot is better than the open vote?

Have our people the right to the same freedom of untrammelled choice which the electors of all other free countries enjoy.

Dr. Thompson, Yukon, in the Dominion House of Commons last week, wanted something done about freight rates on joint land and water systems, such as that leading to the Yukon. Mr. Letourneau made some point concerning the double railway and intermediate boats leading to points in Prince Edward Island.

In the winter the government owned the three systems and the charges were much higher than for similar distances on the railway.

For instance, the freight on grain from Montreal to Halifax, 852 miles, is 9 cents per hundred pounds. From Charlottetown to an outward point, 1,200 miles off, the rate is 40 cents.

The rate from Charlottetown to Pictou, 70 miles, is higher than from Montreal to Halifax, twelve times as far. This injustice ought to be remedied at once.

The Union Herald, which is issued monthly by the Union Church, at Ridgefield Park, N. S., has a most complimentary reference to a native of this Province--Rev. Allan McNeill, who is a son of Mrs. Emily McNeill of Crapaud. Rev. Mr. McNeill is pastor of the Presbyterian Union Church, Ridgefield Park, N. S., and recently has had to seek rest and restoration of shattered health at the Jackson Health Resort, at Alton Vista, Dansville, N. Y. It was the occasion of his return to better health that prompted the authorities of the resort and others who had been associated with Mr. McNeill to write the trustees of his church, congratulating them on the fact that they were soon to have their pastor back; and stating that during his weeks of resting and recuperating at Dansville he had made for himself a large place in the affections of guests and family alike and won the esteem and respect of everybody. The Union Herald, in commenting on this says "the writers are not ardent admirers of post-mortem eulogies. If they have a kind, helpful word to say about anybody they believe in saying it out loud."

There is every possibility that this summer this Province may have the pleasure of a visit from the famous Rudyard Kipling, the "poet of the Empire" as he has been called, and whose stories are probably well known to the majority of reading people in Prince Edward Island. Mr. Kipling's fame is world-wide, and he is the favorite author of all who admire the strong note of patriotism for Britain expressed in literature that the distinguished man will enjoy his visit is very probable, and his admirers here may have the opportunity of seeing him at close range. His visit will probably be brought about through Dr. Andrew McPhail, of McGill University, Montreal, who is a native of Eldon, where he spends the summer with his family. Last year, during Mr. Kipling's visit to Canada he and Dr. McPhail were thrown much together, and it is as the Doctor's guest that Mr. Kipling is expected to come. Dr. McPhail is now recognized as one of the leading literary men of Canada, his contributions on Canadian questions always receiving respectful attention the world over. His very successful novels, to which The Guardian has from time to time drawn attention, are given a high reputation in Great Britain, where they have been most favorably reviewed; in his native Province, however, they seem to have been somewhat overlooked, and bear out the truth of the proverb, that "a prophet is not without honor, save in his own country."

Yesterday the blue water was plainly visible almost opposite the Rocky Point wharf and as far out as the eye could reach. Floating ice was also reported around Point Prim all of which gives promise to an early opening of navigation.

The death occurred at Cape Traverse on Saturday, from a relapse of la grippe, of Montague Muttart, a well-known and much esteemed resident. Mr. Muttart was a son of the late Lewis Muttart, Cape Traverse, and leaves to mourn a widow and four children--Harry, Winnie, Bertha and Alice, all of whom reside at home.

Yesterday the winter steamers made round trips between Georgetown and Pictou. The Stanley left Georgetown at 5 a. m. with a cargo of seed oats and got back at 5 p. m., and the Minto which left Pictou early in the morning had a quick trip across and took back to Pictou a full load of oats. Mails and passengers arrived in this City at eleven o'clock a. m.

Reports come from various sections near Charlottetown, indicating that the ice on the bays and rivers is not to be trusted. At the Three Tides in Charlottetown harbor there is open water, extending out to the Hillsboro Bay. In many places on the East West and North Rivers the ice is unsafe. From Pinette comes word of horses breaking through the ice in that bay, and it is evident that travelling on the ice requires caution at the present time. Probably such unusually mild weather as has prevailed during the month just past has not been known for a good many years. A temperature by day ten degrees above the freezing point, a bright warm sun, and streets and sidewalks free from snow are certainly extraordinary conditions for the latter part of February in this country.
