Fred J. Macleod's work in welding and cohering the sometimes discordant elements of the Democracy in a fighting force that has at last become not only formidable but successful cannot be overlooked where the history of recent political movement in this State comes to be written. Mr. Macleod conducted the Vahey campaign of 1909 with signal ability helping to hammer down a high Republican majority into a matter of four figures. He did still more last fall, for it was due to him in a large measure that the Faneuil Hall fiasco that seemed to spell defeat was patiently, courageously, and it may also be said gloriously turned into unity of action that resulted in the election of Governor Pease. An able political general leave the command to others with the army in better organization than it has known for years.
