The characters are seen in life size, moving about without the use of any visible screen, so that they appear to act upon a real theater scene, which is lighted, as is customary in such cases. This remarkable result is brought about by optical combinations, which have as yet not been made pub- lic.

Adrianople Postage Stamps. The Turkish government recently took an unusual way to celebrate its retention of the ancient city of Adrian- ople, the object of so much desperate fighting and bitter controversy during the Balkan war. It issued a special series of three postage stamps, each of which bore the word "Adrianople" and a picture of the famous mosque of Selim I. The stamps were used only one month and only in the Turkish em- pire.

Switzerland and its Army. Even little Switzerland is crying out against the increasing cost of the mili- tary arm of government. The total estimated revenue of Switzerland for 1914 is \$20,000,000. The total estimat- ed expenditure of the government is \$21,085,000. By far the heaviest item of expenditure is the army, which calls for \$9,150,000. Trade, industry and ag- riculture call for \$3,375,000 and the home office for \$3,225,000.

CANAL THROUGH A TUNNEL.

Great Engineering Feat That France is Pushing to Completion. We are not the only country with a canal job that is nearly completed. In the south of France there is being dug the last link in the system of water communication that will join Marseilles with the north of France. It is already possible to cross from the English channel to the Mediterra- nean by canal, but there was no great port at the southern end of the sys- tem; hence the present canal. The striking feature is that the canal will pass through a tunnel nearly four and a half miles long. This tunnel comes soon after leaving the harbor of Marseilles. It will be forty-eight feet high and seventy-three feet wide, with nearly twenty feet of water in it. The amount of rock excavated is eight times as much per yard of ad- vance as in the Sionpion tunnel, but it is being dug at the rate of nearly twenty feet a day. After passing through the tunnel the canal will turn to the west and border the lake of Berre. At Port de Bouc it will join the present canal from Arles, which will be enlarged. The cost will be about \$14,000,000.—Boston Globe.

World's Tallest Building. Plans have recently been filed with the bureau of buildings, New York, for an office building which on its comple- tion will be the tallest in the world, reaching a maximum height of 804 feet 6 inches. The structure is pro- posed to be built on the block bounded by Broadway, Eighth avenue, Fifty- seventh and Fifty-eighth streets. It will be fifty-one stories high, with basement and sub-basement. The fa- cade will be of brick and light stone, and the design will be ornamental, fol- lowing broadly the Gothic style. The building is to be built by the Pan- American States association, and the tower is to be surmounted by an allego- rical figure representing the associa- tion. The estimated cost is \$12,500,000.

Citizenship Training. With the co-operation of the National Municipal league and other organiza- tions long interested in the problem of education for citizenship the United States bureau of education is under- taking a comprehensive study of the whole problem of civic education. The work will be under the immediate di- rection of Arthur W. Dunn, now of New York, who made for himself a na- tional reputation some years ago by his work in this subject in the public schools of Indianapolis. In this field of activity the government bureau of education hopes to do officially and systematically what has heretofore been attempted by a number of orga- nizations working independently.

Captain Scott's Journals. The original autograph journals kept by Captain Scott throughout his an- arctic expedition, including those car- ried with him to the pole in which his last "Message to the Public" was writ- ten, have been placed by Lady Scott in the British museum. The trustees have authorized the exhibition of the journals in a temporary case in the de- partment of manuscripts.
