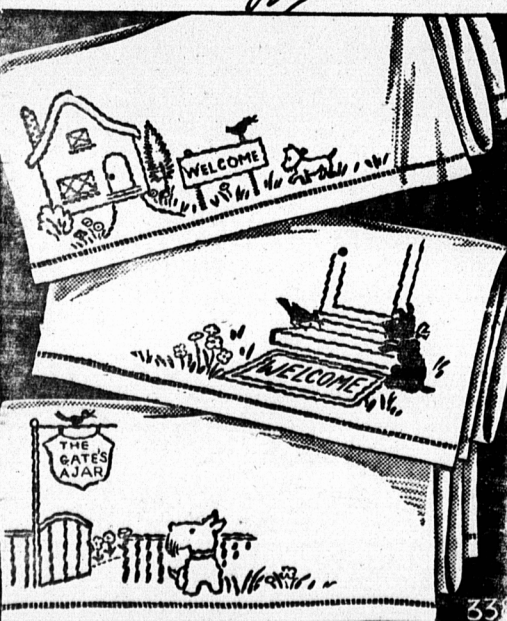

THE COOK'S CORNER

CRYSTALLIZED PINEAPPLE.

Remove slices of pineapple from can and place on a wire rack to drain. Make sufficient syrup to cover pineapple by putting equal parts of water and sugar. When the syrup has come to a boil put the pineapple in and let boil twenty minutes. Remove from fire and let stand overnight.

It is preferable to do a small amount of pineapple at a time, otherwise your syrup will become too thick. In case it should become too thick, add a few drops of hot water.

LEMON PIE

Bake pastry over an inverted pie plate. Before baking, prick the pastry all over with a fork and set the plate on a tin sheet to keep the edge from contact with the oven. Set the cooked paste inside a clean plate of the same size, pour in a cooked filling spread with meringue and let bake in a very moderate oven about twenty minutes.

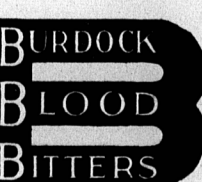
