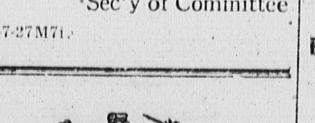

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age who has homesteaded a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after gaining homestead patent, also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homesteaded land may take a purchased quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. G. ISLAND BOY DROWNED AT JERSEY BEECH

Ronald J. McDonald, 17 years of age, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander J. McDonald, of Russel avenue, while in bathing at Coddington Cove, New Jersey with other boys, lost his life two weeks ago.

Young McDonald after dinner went to the point on his bicycle, and waited there for two of his sisters who were also to go in bathing with him. One of them went in, she being a good swimmer and was some little distance away from her brother, who was walking about in the water up to almost his shoulders, when suddenly he disappeared. He had evidently stepped into a hole and failed to come up again. There were others in

bathing but a naval reservist who was in a small boat was the first to reach the spot where McDonald disappeared. The reservist dove overboard and located the boy and then assisted in bringing it ashore.

Work of resuscitation was begun at once and in the meantime a message had been sent to police headquarters from which point City Physician Keenan was summoned and with Inspector Tobin, Engineer Kirby and Mechanician Esleek they rushed to Coddington Cove with the pulmotor.

The efforts of the pulmotor were in vain as the boy had evidently died sometime before the physician and nurses arrived after their last run to the scene.

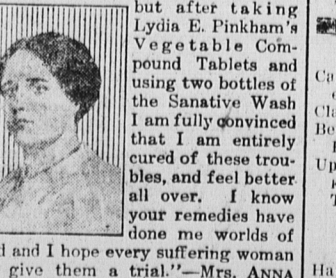
Medical Examiner Sherman after examining the body stated heart failure due to shock, caused death. The body was removed to his home by Undertaker O'Neill.

The boy's father was one of the early arrivals at the point. Seeing the police patrol go down Mallone road he surmised that something had happened and with Mr. Frank Coridon in the latter's automobile they followed. It was a severe shock to Mr. McDonald when he saw his son's body.

The funeral took place on Wednesday morning at St. Joseph's Church and was largely attended. Rev. E. A. Higney, the Pastor, celebrated a High Mass of Requiem. There were many relatives from out of town including his uncle, Rev. Bro. Paul of Westches-

The following soldiers letters have recently been received by Miss Helen Fleigher of Victoria.

Somewhere in France June 25th, 1917 Dear Miss Fleigher:—Just a line to let you know I received a pair of socks which left you on April 15th. I must thank you very much for them. I got them when I was in the trenches and was very glad to get them. It is a great comfort for one to get a change of socks in the trenches. I have been out here in France for over ten months. My address is No. 181160, Pte. R. J. Gray, No. 1 Coy., 7th Battalion, Canadians, B. E. F. I have not reached my twentieth birthday yet and will not do so until next February.

The weather has been showery the last couple of weeks. It takes very little rain out here to make this country muddy.

I will close now, hoping to hear from you soon. I am your very sincerely

France, July 6, 1917 Dear Kind Friend:—I take the pleasure of thanking you for your contribution of comforts to us soldiers. The socks you sent were just what the boys were in need of, for the weather had been very wet and the trenches in most places held anywhere from one to two feet of water, so a pair of dry socks are quite a comfort under such conditions.

Although we are supplied every other day with clean socks there are times when the best regulated machinery goes wrong, and such a thing happened when we received your contribution. The regular issue failed to come up that night, but instead your parcel of comforts was in the mail.

The weather here is clearing up now, and I hope we will have a spell of fine weather. My number is 466934 No. 1 Company, 7th Battalion, Canadians, B. E. F., France.

RACES AT GEORGETOWN

Successful horse races were held at Georgetown on Wednesday. The weather was fine and the track in first class condition.

There were three classes the 2.19 trot and pace, the 2.40 trot, and the three minute trot and pace. Every event was well contested there being seven starters in the 2.19, four in the 2.40 and four in the three minute.

Dunholme owned and driven by Hammond Kelly added to his list of triumphs this season by easily winning the 2.19 in three straight heats. Brenton H., taking second money and Commodore Grant third. Brenton H., acted badly the first heat, but finished second in the other two. The Commodore was second in the first heat but after that went to pieces, and got only seventh place on the second and third.

The most exciting race of the day was the 2.40 trot. It was won by Cap Cresceus, but it was a battle royal from start to finish in each heat, the winner having but little time to spare, and the whole field generally being bunched. Claude 1., took second money and Upton Prince and Better Not divided third.

BRONZE MEDAL FOR CORP. MCMASTERS

Donald McMasters, Esq., 106-17, France. Hamilton, Ont. Sir—I expect you have long since been informed that your son Corpl. McMasters was wounded in an attack on the night of 5-6 May. The attack was on a particularly difficult piece of trench known as the (censored) your trench was wounded in the right forearm by either a piece of shrapnel or a machine gun bullet. After he was wounded he continued to work his Machine Gun with one arm, under a deadly fire and did great execution, besides setting a splendid example to the rest of the Gun Crew. However he is now safe in Blighty. Your son has a splendid record in this battalion for his coolness and bravery under fire. He had been decorated with the Italian Cross. May say that I took a particular interest in him as he probably saved my life on one occasion, when a large German, "Minnewerfer" was coming thru the air he warned me just in time to get out of the way of it, so that I got nothing worse than a severe shaking up from concussion.
