Good Racing Witnessed As Victoria Driving Club Holds Meet On Saturday

Factor Lane of the day was captured in the veteran campaigner Hal Britton when handled ably by Eric "Ike" Moreside he trotted the first heat of the Class A Trot and pace in the afternoon. Hal Britton was recently purchased by Rollie Wood of Southport from Mr. A. B. Cutcliffe.

Times in all heats were good over a very fast track and the officials in charge did a workmanlike job in getting the events run off in a smooth and efficient manner. Starter Russ Abbott did a fine job of getting his fields away with a minimum of scolding.

Last heat: The four starters were neck and neck half way down the stretch but in the final eighth it was strictly between Hal Britton and Jane Harvester with Hal coming under the wire a head to the good.

Second Heat: It was a three way battle between Hal Britton, Walt N' See and Jane Harvester all the entire quarter 10 yards from the wire Walt N' See seemed to be inches in front only to jump it off with Hal trotting steadily coming under the wire first; Jane Harvester second, Walt N' See third and Nell Cochotadale, a short distance back fourth.

Third Heat: Walt N' See who was improving as the race progressed had too much steam for the field in the final heat winning from Jane Harvester by a head with Hal dropping back to fourth and Nell Cochotadale again fourth.

In the next heat it was a hard battle all the way down between Lawless Peter and Laddie MacGregor with Lawless just a shade to the surprise move. This paid off however, in another victory for the veteran goal-tender who hasn't lost in three games. He replaced the veteran Normie Smith, Detroit's home goal.

Week-End Football Bonspiel Results Results In Britain At Curling Club

LONDON, Jan. 16—(CP Cable)—The biggest crowd of football fans met transport routes to the Villa Park where the visiting Stoke City lapped into a 3-0 victory in the Football League cup qualifying competition by defeating Aston Villa 2-0.

Featuring a day that had many postponements, the game was played before a gate of 30,000 with the winners fielding their star international, Stan Matthews. For the second time in three years, Matthews was held scoreless, but his brilliant dribbling set up the scoring plays.

Tom Lawton, Everton's crack leader, scored five goals as Everton swamped Crewe 6-2 and retained the cup lead. Everton has scored 27 goals against six in four games since the qualifying competition opened.

West Bromwich overwhelmed Watford 7-1 and secured a 19-year-old amateur find in the hat-trick Blackpool edged out Southampton 2-1 before 10,000 people in a Bath stadium. The cellar-dwelling Aberystwyth drew 2-2.

In an international match Holland defeated Belgium 3-2.

The League South program was cut short by postponements. The leading Tottenham Hotspurs just managed to nip Southampton 2-2. Luton and Millwall drew 1-1.

Sensation of Scottish play was the 2-1 defeat of Glasgow Rangers by St. Mirren in a Southern League match. The Rangers retained a five-point league lead, however, because Celtic in second place, lost 2-1 to Albion, Dumbarton and Partick Thistle, drew 2-2.

Dunfermline, northeastern circuit leaders, swamped Rangers 6-2.

Anticipate More U. S. Steel For Civilians

CLEVELAND, Jan. 16—(AP)—Steelmakers and consumers anticipate modification of a war production board limitation order further easing the supply of raw materials for civilian goods, the magazine Steel reported today, recalling recent releases of steel for baby carriages, flatware, bathtubs, and other items.

"With most war requirements well in hand and overall capacity sufficient for these needs, no excess," the trade publication's weekly summary predicted release of steel for "needs most essential for maintaining the domestic economy."
