NATIONAL ANTHEM  
The Regent, Mrs. MacCreedy, who received Viscountess Willingdon and party on entering, read the following address of welcome.

May it please Your Excellency:  
On behalf of the Royal Edward Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire, I beg to extend to you a most cordial welcome on this, your first visit to our City and Province. Our welcome is the more ardent because your Excellency has been graciously pleased to accept the Honorary Presidency of our Imperial Order in the Dominion of Canada.

As for our Province it boasts not of the grandeur and sublimity of snow-capped mountains, or of boundless prairies, broad inland seas, con-

quering rivers or thundering cataracts. Ours is only the quiet beauty of a garden Province in the midst of the all-embracing sea, to which, however, in the order of nature, all the great lakes, rivers and cataracts pay a constant tribute.

The people of this Province enjoy the distinction over all other Provinces of Canada, that they are almost entirely natives of the land in which they live, and, also, that during one hundred and fifty-four years past they have had a government and Legislature of their own choice, enacting and administering laws in accord with their well-understood wishes.

The Fathers from the beginning of our history under the impress of Crown had stamped the impress of Royalty upon all their public institutions. So it was by the desire of a Royal Duke, that our three counties are known as King's, Queen's and Prince. Also our Capital City of Charlottetown was so named in honour of a British Queen, and the names of our public squares, and principal streets in like manner attest the regard and reverence for our Sovereign Lord and King.

As Daughters of the Empire we regard with satisfaction the note of patriotic loyalty which has so impressively characterized the recent celebration of the Dominion Jubilee in every city, town and hamlet within its widely extended boundaries.

And it is with a measure of patriotic pride that we recall the fact that here in our Capital City was held the initial conference at which the foundation of our national fabric was laid, and now that it spans the continent at its widest part and extends northward to the Arctic Ocean and the Northern Pole, we rejoice in its great expansion.

It was the prophetic vision of the aboriginal inhabitants that this Island was a Cradle and destined to future greatness. Hence they named it "Abequwit," "Cradled on the Waves," as we express it in the languages of that other rather notable Island which we call England. Today we realize as never before that here is the veritable Cradle of the great Confederation—here it was first set in motion to rock the Infant Dominion—that has since grown to such Imperial stature.

Your Excellency will, we feel sure, pardon this warm expression of love for our own dear Province. Well do we love the Motherland beyond the sea, and the Dominion of which we form a part, but not of all we love our modest Island home.

That your present stay among us must be so brief is a matter of sincere regret to us all.

Most heartily our chapter extends best wishes for Your Excellency's happiness and welfare in the future, while we cherish the hope "that at no distant date you may visit "The Island" again.
