The Markets

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—The export trade with the United Kingdom and the continent was again of a very limited character here today. Outside of sales of a few cars of oats the local market for cash grain was quiet and prices were unchanged. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a quiet demand from all sources. A moderate amount of business was worked in all lines of millfeed and the undertone was firm. The tone of the market for standard grades of rolled oats was steady with a small business passing. A feature of the egg trade was the increased demand for storage eggs between jobbing houses and some fair sized lots changed hands. The undertone was steady for both fresh and storage grades. The receipts were 2,574 cases. The potato market continued dull but prices were unchanged. Car lots of Prince Edward Island green mountains were quoted at \$1.15 per bag of 90 lbs. Prince Edward Island white potatoes, ex-track, and broken lots, New Brunswick green mountains at \$1.00 per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk, and New Brunswick white potatoes at 95c per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk, ex-track. The condition of the market for imported beans was unchanged, prices being firm with a small trade passing. Car lots of choice white handpicked were quoted at \$2.55 per bushel, ex-track, and broken lots at \$2.75 per bushel, ex-track. Owing to the continued limited demand from all sources for butter and the liberal supplies available on spot an easier feeling developed and prices scored a decline of 1-4 cents per lb., but even at this reduction buyers showed little disposition to operate. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at 35-1/2 cents to 36 cents per lb. The receipts were 67 packages, without any new feature to note, business being dull and prices unchanged. The receipts were 476 boxes. OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 4.—(Eggs)—There is no further change in Canadian markets today with a generally unsettled feeling still a feature of the trade. Toronto—There is little change in the local market although if anything there is a more steady feeling prevailing. Dealers are quoting country shippers extra 50 cents, first 45 cents, second 30 cents, 60 lbs. cases returned. Storage eggs are selling to retailers at extra 44 cents, first 42 cents, second 32 cents. Montreal—The egg market here is dull and weak with some accumulation of stocks and there has been a 3 to 4 cents decline on the market for both fresh and storage. The market on turkeys is weak with trade slow. St. John—The market here is dull and continuing to work lower as receipts increase with favorable weather.

The group, described by Sydney Smith as the Clapham Set, had in it many such men as William Wilberforce, Henry Thornton and Zachary Macaulay—men who spent much time in prayer, were ever active in good works and also were generous givers. When the Welsh Minister, touched by the eagerness of the little girls for the word of God, came up to London and pleaded for these men and others cast in the same worthy mould for means to provide the people of Wales with bibles, we are not surprised that out of that meeting sprang that organization which has been the mother of all the Bible Societies of today. The text "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" has caused much trouble to Christians. Many have tried to evade it, or to explain it away. Not so the Bible Society, who, having taken up the task have never since turned back. HALF CENTURY AGO IN CANADA THERE WAS ALSO AN OPEN WINTER

An open winter such as Ontario has been enjoying, and which has been a marvel to many, was, according to newspaper reports, also experienced by Canadians fifty years ago. Looking back over files of The Globe in 1877-78, one finds records of plowing proceeding until after Christmas in Victoria Settlement, Manitoba, where wheat seed was sown. Plowing on many farms in the neighborhood of Hillsdale, Ontario, was recorded as late as Jan. 3, 1878. The scarcity of snow, claimed The Globe of half a century ago, delayed lumbering operations in New Brunswick. A cricket match was played in Brantford on Dec. 28, 1877, and it was reported that the ground was in wonderful condition, considering the time of the year. Toronto Bay was frozen over on Jan. 4, 1878, but was not safe for skating.
