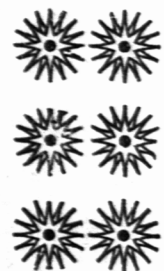

IN THE SENATE.

There has been much talk in the country and much discussion among public men and in the party press as to the chances of the Drummond Railway Bill and the Grand Trunk Agreement passing the Senate. A strong section of the Conservative press appealed confidently to that body to throw out both measures. Very powerful railway influences were arrayed against these measures mainly because the agreement with that road would give it the distribution of all west-bound freight arriving in Montreal by the Intercolonial. It will also be remembered that last year the Senate threw out the Bill to confirm the agreement then pending with the Drummond County Railway. Although the Bill of this year is different in its terms and more favorable to the country, there was a pretty general impression that the Senate was still hostile and would reject it.

It is however, the unexpected that has happened. The attempt to kill both these measures by the "six months hoist" was in both cases defeated by a vote of 17 to 37. Thus both bills have passed their second readings in the Senate by a majority of 20. The Government is to be congratulated on having secured the passage of these important measures which place on a secure basis the extension of the Government Railway system to Montreal. We believe the country will endorse this action and commend the wisdom of the Senate in not further obstructing the Government's railway policy.

The meeting of the Maritime Medical Association in our city is the result of a movement inaugurated nine or ten years ago, by which concerted action of the medical societies in the three Provinces was secured. The annual meetings are held successively in each of the provinces, and in like manner the office of president passes round in succession. This is New Brunswick's year for the presidency, and the choice has fallen upon Dr. James Christie, a prominent member of the profession in St. John. One of the fruits of the Maritime Medical Association has been to secure inter-provincial registration for physicians and surgeons in the three Maritime Provinces. It is hoped before long to have this system extended throughout the Dominion so that a duly registered doctor can practice his profession in any part of Canada.

The new pastor of Grace Church, the Rev. M. N. McConnell with Mrs. McConnell and their children arrived by the Jacques Cartier last night. They were met on the wharf by some of the church friends and driven to the parsonage, where the ladies had made everything ready for a kind and pleasing reception. Through the care-taking efforts of the ladies, constituting the parsonage furnishing committee, the manse has been renovated inside and made to look very inviting indeed. In a few remarks the pastor expressed himself as being very much pleased with such a cordial welcome and desired that the friends would not forget to call and see them off. After singing "Bless be the tie that binds," the friends dispersed to their several homes.

Committee appointed to report on death of Dr. Dodge moved the following motion; Dr. Taylor, of Charlottetown, reading it:

That this Society desires to express its great sorrow on account of the death of the late Dr. Dodge, of Halifax, one of its members and late President of the Medical Society of Nova Scotia.

His skill as a physician, his character as a man and usefulness as a member of this Society were of the highest order. He always took the greatest interest in our proceedings by his attendance, and valuable contributions.

To his widow and family we offer our most sincere condolence, and beg them to be assured that no language is too strong to express our admiration of his sterling qualities.

He was a man of strong opinions, and never said behind a man's back what he would not say to his face.

Dr. Cameron, of Antigonish, in supplementing the motion, referred to his acquaintanceship with Dr. Dodge, and had much pleasure in seconding the motion—carried.

Dr. Chisholm referred to Dr. Hamilton's paper, where quacks had spoken of this condition many years ago, and their suggestion of using abdominal belts, and also referred to the evil resulting from not using support after childbirth, which might lead to condition of enteroptosis.

Dr. Hamilton thanked Association for vote of thanks. Cold sets baths are often of benefit from results on abdominal viscera—one minute one day and longer each day. Fanatism also gives considerable relief.

Dr. McMillan, of Pictou, moved a vote of thanks to Dr. Cushing for his very valuable paper, seconded and carried.

Dr. C. D. Murray, of Halifax, was then called upon and read a paper on the "Sanatorium Treatment of Tuberculosis."

Dr. Botsford, of Moncton, said he would not wear the Association with reading all his paper, as considerable of it was already covered by Dr. Murray. He wished to make the following motion:

"That the President appoint a committee of nine, three from each province, to consider the advisability of establishing for the said provinces a sanatorium or sanatoria for the cure of incipient pulmonary tuberculosis, that the committee appointed for N. B. and P. E. I. interview their respective governments, stating the curability of consumption by the sanatorial system of open air treatment of the most deadly enemy of the human race, asking each provincial government to assist in this undertaking, and that the general committee present to the Association a complete and full report at the next meeting of this society in 1900."

Dr. McLeod had much pleasure in supporting the motion even if it was only to give the profession, an object lesson. He would suggest the removing from the motion all words beginning with "asking each provincial government etc." The open air treatment is par excellence and especially with creasote given up to 15 drops three times a day in milk and often had splendid results. An association that neglected vital statistics was negligent to its duties.

Dr. Cameron, of Antigonish referred to use of alcohol in judicious doses, and also mentioned that those addicted to use of alcohol seldom became infected with tuberculosis.

The establishment of sanatoria by the Government must have behind it public sentiment. Until the profession gives this matter the widest circulation, not till then will we get support from the Governments.

Dr. Botsford spoke of a large meeting held in St. John recently, in which the people were greatly interested, and several influential men had promised considerable sums for the establishment of a sanatorium.

Dr. McPhail opposed the resolution as he did not see how it could be carried out. He referred to a case which did splendidly on open air treatment. Motion was put and carried.

EVENING SESSION

Dr. H. D. Hamilton of Montreal read a paper on "Papillomata of the Larynx." A vote of thanks was moved the doctor for his valuable paper. Dr. H. D. Johnson referred to two cases of injury to the Taryna.

Dr. Conroy read a paper on "Septic Infection." It was discussed by different doctors, and he received a vote of thanks for his paper.

Dr. McLeod brought up the matter of legislation for registering mortuary statistics and committees were appointed from the three provinces to bring the subject before the legislatures of the three provinces.

A vote of thanks was moved to the retiring President.

At 10 o'clock in the evening the visiting members of the association were tendered an informal dinner at the Hotel Davies.
