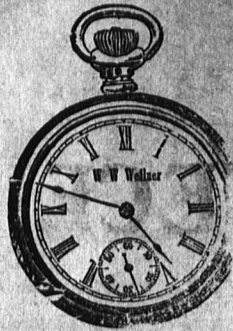

THE Presbytery of Egerton met in St. Andrew's church Pictou, on Sept 18th, at 1 p.m. The Rev. L. J. MacLean, as Moderator announced that the first business before the Presbytery was the resignation of the Rev. M. J. Campbell, as pastor of the Birch Hill P. E. I. congregation. Mr. Campbell, being called upon, stated that the cause of his resignation was his inability to perform the duties required in so large a congregation on account of his health. Rev. D. MacLean appealed in behalf of the congregation and expressed his regret at losing the assistance of Mr. Campbell in the large field under the charge of the Presbytery in Prince Edward Island; Mr. Campbell presided for the last year had been very much improved and parted with their pastor with regret. The resignation was accepted and all members of the Presbytery expressed their sorrow at parting with Mr. Campbell. The Rev. Jas. McDougall was appointed to preach and declare the pulpit vacant on Sabbath the 30th inst. Rev. D. MacLean was appointed interim Moderator of the Birch Hill Session. The subject of union was then taken up and Presby. wished all the congregation in connection with the Kirk to take a vote on the subject the last week of October or the first week of November. The meeting then adjourned to meet at call of Moderator.
