As a mother she will know more about the training of her family and will be able to guard them from many a pitfall spread for their unwilling feet.

This paper was thoughtful and instructive, full of interest and was commented upon by Mrs. Johnson and others. The next item on the program was a parliamentary drill conducted by Mrs. Rutherford, President of Dominion W. C. T. U. For half an hour a question was discussed in such a manner as shows that the majority of women are capable of considering a matter and giving an opinion upon it fully as well as those of the sterner sex.

The question box was opened and several questions answered by Mrs. Rutherford, Mrs. Whitman and others. The proceedings of the session were interspersed by music, two excellent solos being given by Rev. Mr. Whiston and Miss Down both of which added to the enjoyment of the session.

Miss Ellis, the Y. representative from Nova Scotia, was introduced to the Convention by the Courtesy Com. and expressed herself as delighted to be present and to convey the greetings of the N. S. Y's to those assembled.

Thursday evening 5th session, opened with devotional exercises, reading Scripture by Rev. R. F. Whiston, prayer by Rev. D. B. McLeod.

Greetings from the Ministerial Association were conveyed by Rev. G. P. Raymond and fittingly expressed by him in a short address of welcome on behalf of citizens by Mayor Warburton.

Greetings from the Charlottetown Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance were presented by Mr. J. J. Chappell and in behalf of the Sons of Temperance by Mr. J. A. Lawson, G. W. Patriarch of that body.

Response by the President, Mrs. C. E. Strong.

Mrs. Rutherford, the speaker of the evening on being introduced expressed herself as proud to stand on a platform in Canadian city which had shown courage enough to pass a prohibitory Act, thus taking the lead not only for Canada but for many another country the world over. The eyes of the world are upon us, and especially the other Provinces of Canada. In Ontario they have twice voted, yea on the Temperance question and both times the Government have failed to fulfil their promises. Now if the people of this Province stand behind its Government in their efforts to enforce the Bill and make a success of it, it will be a pretty strong Government who will dare remain inactive on this great question in Ontario.

The Dominion Government receives from the liquor traffic about eight millions of dollars annually, while the traffic costs the Government one hundred and fifty millions. Is that good financing we ask? We women do not think so.

The work and object of the W. C. T. U. is purely for the protection of the home,

it was the mother seeking to protect her boy from danger that first gave birth to the W. C. T. U. movement. It was for the protection of the home that Frances Willard gave herself to the great work, one department of which stands for social purity. We believe in the white life for two, we hold that a young man should measure up as pure a character as he demands in a woman.

Reference was made to the cigarette habit and its pernicious influence upon the health and morals of the youth of our land. The sad part is, that this evil is spreading to the young girls as well as the boys. Educationists everywhere are noticing the effect of cigarette using upon the school children. The boy of fourteen who is a habitual cigarette user cannot compete with the boy of twelve who does not touch them. Morally, too, the boy addicted to this habit is not as honest as he ought to be, is not to be trusted.

The W. C. T. U. desire to send out all the missionaries they can with a view to educate the foreigners who settle in our fair Dominion. It had been the speaker's privilege to address a meeting of Icelanders in the city of Winnipeg where there is a W. C. T. U. Union. These people need to be instructed; every one of them have votes and will count in the settlement of this great question which never will be settled till it is settled right.

Dr. Anderson being called upon expressed himself as being thoroughly in accord with every good work. The aim and object of the W. C. T. U. as he understood it is the elevation of humanity. As a teacher of the young all his life he had been engaged in a profession which has for its object the same thing. He was in full sympathy with the teachings of Scientific Temperance in the public schools. Good results must follow the faithful sympathetic teaching of morality and temperance to the young.

Regret was expressed that owing to other engagements the Premier was unable to be present.
