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PREDICTS PACIFIC FACT

AUCKLAND, N.Z., Feb. 2 — (AP) Professor Herbert E. Gregory of Honolulu told the Pacific Science Congress today it will not be long before there will be a Pacific as well as a North Atlantic pact. Gregory stressed the growing importance of the Pacific area. He said the centre of world activity had moved from the Mediterranean to the Atlantic.

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
