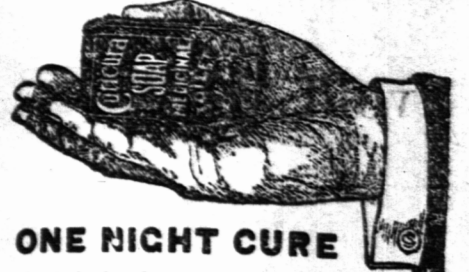

THE REV. J. MACLEOD, The pastor of the Vankleek Hill Presbyterian Church, and a native of Dundas, P. E. Island, who was killed by the falling of the church on Wednesday, Sept. 19th.

D. M. MACLEOD, formerly of New London, P. E. Island, departed this life on Monday afternoon Sept. 3rd, in Spokane, Wash. leaving a wife and three daughters to mourn the loss of a loving husband and father. The funeral services were conducted at his late home corner of Sixth Avenue and Cedar St., by the Rev. Wm Geboney, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of which the deceased had been an active member and for sometime an elder. Though sundered far from relatives, yet many were the friends who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect and beautiful and numerous were the floral tributes forming such a mass of blooming beauty as to hide the casket from view, this being emblematic of a life—the life immortal, upon which the spirit had entered and suggestive of the far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory to which death is but the portal. The quartette choir from the First Presbyterian church, sang softly and sweetly those beautiful hymns "Lead kindly light" and "Asleep in Jesus." The body was laid away in a flower-lined grave in Fairmount Cemetery, a beautiful spot about six miles from Spokane. Mr. MacLeod's boyhood's days were spent in Park Corner, his early manhood in Charlottetown where he met and married Miss Mae Jones of Pownal. Later he went to California, and from there to the Dalles, Oregon, finally settling in Spokane. Wherever his home his genial disposition, kindly smile and word and warm hand-clasp endeared him to all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. In business his integrity and true manliness were his passport to success. In the Church he was a brother beloved, looked up to and consulted by its members and made a confidential friend by the pastor. But to see him at his best was to see him in his own home, where the true gentleman, kind friend, devoted Christian loving, unselfish husband and wisely indulgent father, shed a constant, uplifting influence. For almost three years Mr. MacLeod's health has been failing, and though struggling bravely to conquer the disease that claimed him, yet he preferred a few years with his family to an extension of life by traveling. Always cheerful and thoughtful for the comfort of others, he attended his office, and sat with the family and served dinner as usual a few days before his call came, and when it came he was ready. Of him it may be said, "He so lived that when the summons came to join the innumerable caravan which moves to that mysterious realm, where each shall take his chamber in the silent halls of death, sustained and soothed by an unflinching trust, he approached his grave like one who wraps the draperies of his couch about him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."
