R.C.A.F. LIST OF CASUALTIES

OTTAWA, Aug. 21 — (CP) — The Royal Canadian Air Force in its 340th list of the war today reported five men missing and believed killed during air operations overseas, one killed on active service in Canada and four missing after flying operations in Canada.

The overseas section of the list also contained the names of two men who are prisoners of war, six previously reported dead, one seriously injured on active service and one dangerously ill as a result of injuries suffered on active service.

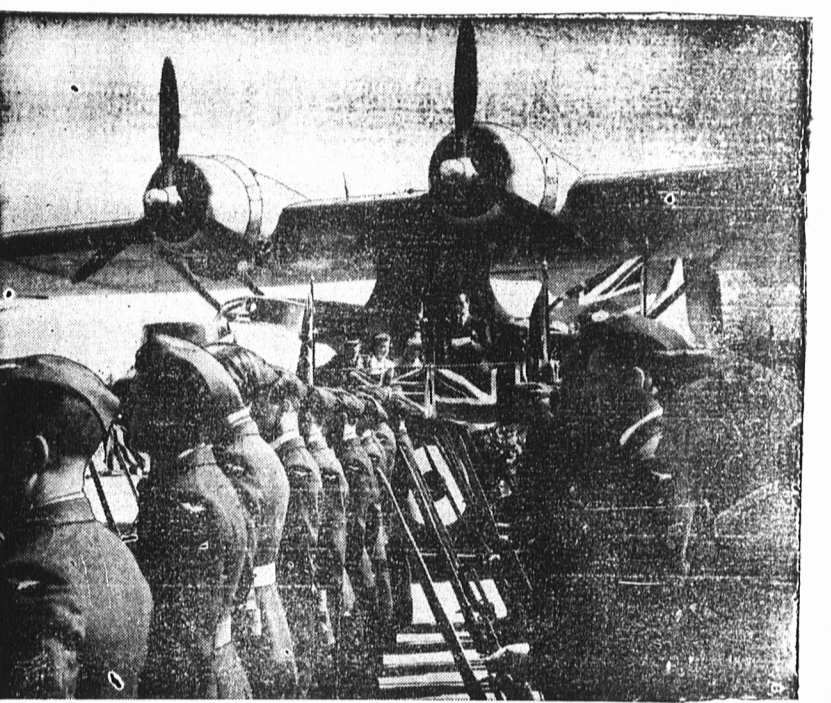
The "Canada" section contained the names of one man seriously injured on active service, one seriously injured accidentally, one dangerously ill as a result of injuries suffered on active service, two dangerously ill, and four seriously ill.

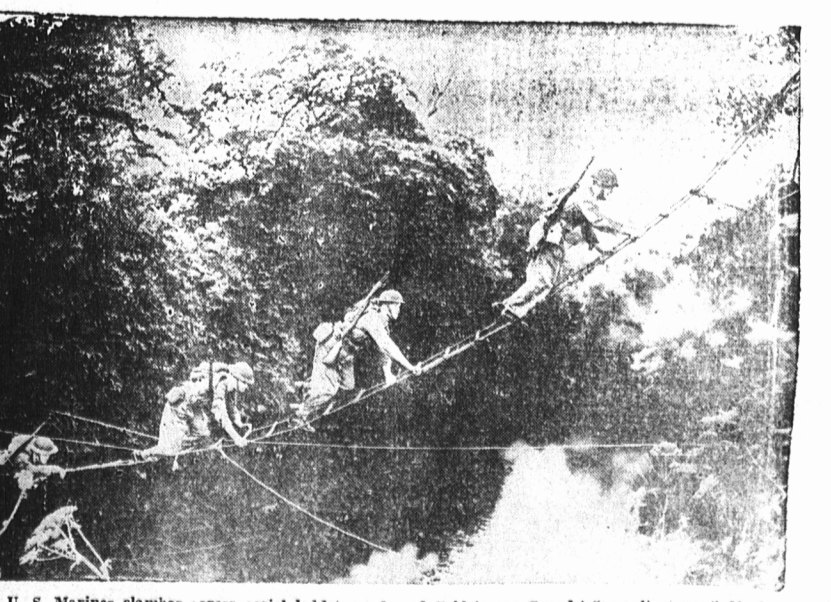
SUCCESSFUL CATALINA TEST SPURS MASS PRODUCTION LINE

When Test Pilot Pat Howard brought in his report Canada he signalled full speed ahead on mass production of these magnificent flying juggernauts. Catalinas are now rolling along the assembly lines at Boeing's Sea Island plant, in British Columbia. In the UPPER photo Test Pilot Howard is shown at the controls of the ship; and BELOW is the scene at the ceremony preceding the test, photographed while Ralph Bell, director of aircraft production, was making his address. In the foreground is the R.C.A.F. guard of honor. The Catalina has the greatest range of any two-engine bomber in the world. Its maximum speed at 8,500 feet altitude is about 200 miles per hour. It weighs 14 tons and its wingspan is so great that 10 automobiles can be lined end to end along the length of each. The Catalina is propelled by two Twin Wasp 1,200-horse power engines and it has gun pits in the nose and rear fuselages, with installations for bombs and aerial torpedoes.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

CLOUD PHOTOGRAPHY



Clouds make grand pictorial subjects by themselves, and the finest kind of background for outdoor scenes.

FROM time immemorial great billowing masses of cloud have fascinated men. Undoubtedly primeval man looked up at the sky and wondered where the thunderheads came from. The Greeks believed that Zeus, hiding behind the rain clouds, amused himself by hurling at the earth the thunderbolts that Vulcan fashioned for him. Today the scientists have told us where the clouds come from, and what makes lightning flash, but we still like to see clouds in the sky and many of us like to picture them with our cameras.

Doing this, as in the above picture, will be a simple matter if you have a filter to aid in your job. A filter—be it yellow, orange, or red—will hold back certain light rays from the sky proper and thus increase the contrast between the clouds and the sky.

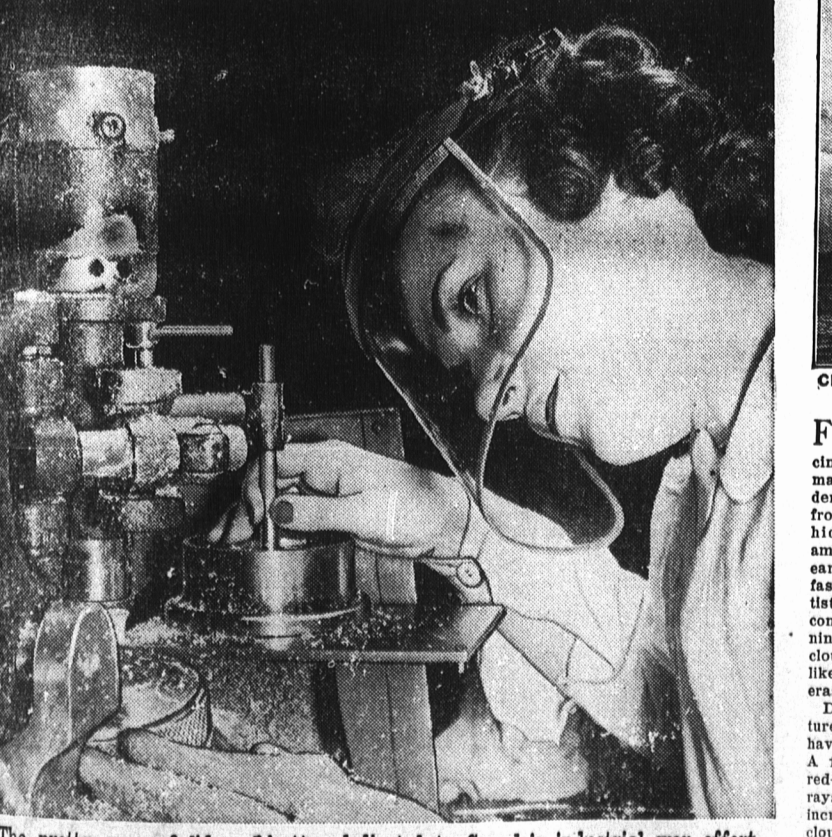
A deep yellow filter was used in making this week's illustration, and a considerable degree of contrast

was obtained. But if a red filter had been used, even more striking contrast between the clouds and the sky would have resulted.

That's all there is to the technical side of picturing clouds, or getting clouds in the background of your pictures, but pictorially picturing clouds isn't all a matter of filters and proper exposure. Actually, to be successful, cloudscape have to be treated much like any landscape picture—and that means you must include some familiar subject in the foreground to be used as a basis of comparison for the distances involved. That familiar subject can be a man, a tree, a house, an animal, or part of the landscape. In our picture this week, it's the graceful gulls.

Don't keep your eyes to the ground at all times. Look at the sky occasionally. Look for interesting clouds and you'll find your pictures ready to be made.
