-ST. PATRICK'S LECTURE AND CONCERT-St. Patrick's Day was fittingly observed in Summerside with the wearing of the "Green." In the evening a special lecture and concert was given in St. Paul's Hall in commemoration of Ireland's patron saint. The lecturer was Rev. Dr. Monaghan of Miscouche, and the hall was filled to capacity with an appreciative audience, who listened with rapt attention to Dr. Monaghan's able address. Rev. J. J. McDonald presided and introduced the speaker, who spoke chiefly on the characteristics of the Irish race. Dr. Monaghan in his opening remarks said that he was speaking to a cosmopolitan gathering representative of the diversified citizenship of Canada, who all honoured St. Patrick despite differences of Creed and race. The lecturer pointed out that the Irish were missionaries and teachers from very early times. In fact since St. Patrick visited Ireland they have been pioneers in the progress of Europe. It has been said that Ireland was composed of saints and scholars. The steadfastness of the Irish people to overcome every obstacle which has been put in the way of their progress has at last been recognized and they have proved to the world that they can govern their own country, the ruling of which has now been granted to them. Rev. Dr. Monaghan paid some high tributes to the Irish people and said that Ireland's illustrious sons are to be found occupying high positions in every country in the world. Many Irishmen have been Governors of the British colonies and some of England's greatest statesmen came from the Emerald Isle. In closing Dr. Monaghan said, that although Canada was made up of many nationalities there was only room for one great nation and that the spirit of devotion and sacrifice which was characteristic of not only the Irish but all the races that have helped to build up Canada has made her one of the foremost nations on the earth. The vocal and instrumental Irish melodies on the program were generously encored and although when all were so good it is hardly fair to single out anyone for special mention. Mrs. Brassard, who is at present visiting in Summerside and who is a graduate of La Salle Conservatoire of Music and the Royal Conservatory of Music in Montreal and has studied under Professor Rodolphe Plamondon, French Canadian tenor, at the Conservatoire Nation at Paris, gave some very beautiful selections, both vocal and instrumental, which were very highly appreciated by the audience. Mr. J. R. Kenney, veteran singer, caused a good deal of merriment when he appeared on the stage as an old Irish gentleman and gave the audience a fine rendition of Irish ditties. 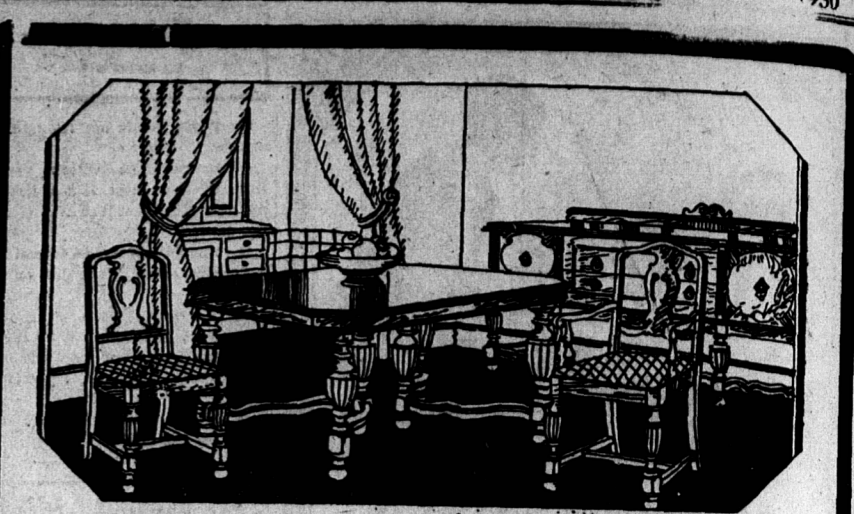
