RUNAWAY BOY'S ROMANCE ENDS

Youthful Alfred Egan, Who Made His Way to Boston from Alberton, P. E. I. Without a Cent—Taken Charge of by Kind Friends of a Society and will be Sent Home.

BOSTON HERALD:—The runaway orphan boy, Alfred Egan, 12 years old, of Alberton, P. E. I., who without a cent in his pocket's, made his way to Boston to find an uncle who worked in a Washington street drug store, will be returned to the care of his grandparents in the Province, and put back to school. The mysterious of his adventure have been explained, his uncle has died, and his pathetic yarns disproved.

It is a hopeless island home, he became tired of so cold and dreamed like Stevenson's "Walden of the Mid" of the lands that lay beyond the skyline of his little world, he wandered about the country to which so many travellers went. So he resolved to set forth to Boston, where his

uncle works, and he said to himself that he, too, would work and become part of the big busy world of his dreams.

In these dreams, his widowed mother who had supported him and his younger sister by taking in washing, had just died, had been laid out in a casket brought in by neighbors and buried, and the half part of his little life's earnings gone forth to become a worker.

Ye farther, at the offices of the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, he began to wake up. Since his arrival at the society rooms, last Friday, Sept. 20, Morton, taking bits of the romance, had been searching out information which changed the story of the previous bulletin to the adventure of a bright runaway boy.

The naive manners of the inexperienced youngster, his clear, fawn like eyes that looked straight at the reporters and the institution superintendent as they confronted him with facts that should have confused him, made it a pathetic fabrications remarkable. Although surprised at the city of his quest, saying that "Boston was bigger than I thought, and I never than Alberton," he was loath to lose his dream.

The most surprised person in the adventure, however, was his uncle, Austin Reed, who works for Parke, Davis & Co., manufacturing chemists and druggists, 83 Washington street north. Mr. Reed couldn't imagine what was up, he told a Herald reporter, when he was asked by telephone to come to the long named society room to see a boy from his native town.

"He was more surprised when he found his nephew, and when the little boy looked at him naively and wouldn't recognize him. At this point the boy finally became wide awake.

"Do you know me?" said the uncle.

"Sure," was the slow reply.

"What's your name?"

"Alfred Egan."

He had told the society officers that his name was McLean, and his mother's name Mary Murphy.

"How did you get here?"

"Trains."

"What are your goods?"

"Work."

When the authorities, finding out from

the boy's school teacher that his grandfather, from whom he ran away, is James P. White of Alberton, asked him "Who is James P. White?" the unabashed youngster promptly responded: "There is no such person."

Next week, however, he will be assigned to such a name and address and put to school, of which he grew tired. To the reporter he said that he didn't want to go to school any more at Alberton because it cost taxes to go to school and that he had enough of school.

"You have 12 grades in school here," said he. "In Alberton there are six grades in the grammar school. I was in the fifth, and that was enough. I want to work like my uncle."

The boy's mother died nine years ago his father four years after. The boy left Alberton without a cent, won the hearts of conductors and fellow-travellers between there and Summerside, then worked his way to Point du Chene to St. John and on to Bangor. On a train at Bangor he fell under the attention of Dr. Charles S. Spencer of Chelsea, who was won by the little fellow's naive ways and paid his fare to this city. The doctor then placed the boy in the hands of the children's society, last Friday. Since then the society was busy doing a Sherlock Holmes stand looking "ah uncle from Alberton, who worked in a drugstore on Washington street."

How the lad expected to find his uncle in the city, with such meagre information and experience and without a cent to live on, he alone can tell. He is 12 years old, however, which means he is without fear and has nerve.
