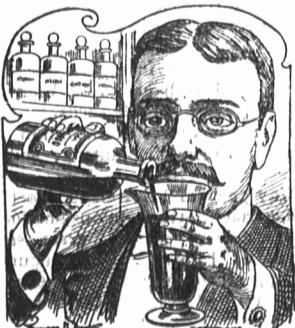

ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

Rev. E. Gillis will D. V. preach on Sabbath May 8 at Murray Harbor North at 11 a. m. and Peters Road at 2.30.

The regular annual meeting of the Abegweit Athletic Club is to be held at seven tonight in the League of the Cross Building.

At the Police Court yesterday Harry McNeill, a colored lad who was arrested the previous night, was arraigned on three charges of assault. In each case he was fined \$5 or 30 days.

In 1847, the year of the Belfast riot and just fifty seven years ago today, men crossed the Hillsboro River below Pownal Wharf to Southport with horses and sleighs. The occurrence is still fresh in the minds of some of the older men of the city.

The series of meetings being held this month by the Y. M. C. A. at 3.45 on Sunday afternoon, are intensely interesting. They are for men only. Let every man come. Rev. J. P. Falconer, who is preaching in Zion Church, will address this meeting on Sunday next.

There was opened this week in our city a Christian Science Reading Room. The ostensible object of the promoters of the room is to give the people an opportunity to read the literature of Christian Science. The room is very comfortably furnished and lighted and is in the Crosses Block on Grafton Street, and will commencing Monday next be open each Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 2.30 to 5.30 p. m. and every evening from 7.30 to 9.30 p. m. Some one will be in charge each time and will make any visitors very welcome.

A Toronto despatch of the 2nd says:—Late last night James Brunette, aged 19, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., while walking along the railway tracks at lower end of York street, attempted to board a rapidly moving freight train, tripped and fell beneath the wheels, which passed over his right leg, crushing it. Brunette was taken to York street station, where he was attended to by the Grand Trunk surgeon, who ordered his removal to the hospital. He was conveyed to the Toronto General Hospital in the police ambulance. Today his injured leg was amputated.

This death is announced of Charles H. Dearborn, of the firm of Dearborn & Co., of this city. The deceased, who was 72 years of age, had not been in good health for some time. For the last twenty years Mr. Dearborn had not wintered in St. John, and latterly had spent the whole of the colder half of the year in the south. He left as usual last fall for the south, but paid a visit to the New England Sanatorium before going to Florida. He again visited this institution in December. At the beginning of last week Mr. Dearborn went back for the third time, and his death is announced as taking place there yesterday. It was in October, 1868, that Charles H. Dearborn, with Trueman Flint and W. S. Green, came from Boston and established their spice mills at the corner of Smythe and Nelson streets, under the name of Flint, Dearborn & Co. By integrity and industry they quickly built up a business extending through this and neighboring provinces. Mr. Flint retired in 1874, his place being taken by John N. Dearborn. In 1877 their premises were lost in the great fire, but the firm rebuilt on Waterloo street. In 1883 they removed to their present premises on Prince William and Water Streets, taking their mills to 240 Union street. Mr. Dearborn leaves one son, Fred R. Dearborn, a partner in the firm. His wife was a Miss Wellington of Boston, Mass. Mrs. Allan Wetmore of this City is a niece of the deceased, and a nephew, Harry Dearborn, is living in California. Mr. Dearborn was a member of Union St. Congregational Church in which he took an active interest.—St John Sun.

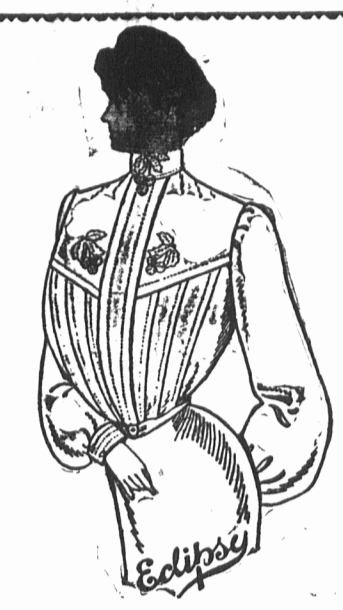
CRUSHED IN ICE; VESSEL SANK.
