SUNDAY RADIO MONCTON, Nov. 14. - As guest artist during the Canadian National Railways all Canada symphony hour on Sunday afternoon, November 17, commencing at 6.00 p. m. Atlantic Standard Time Ellen Ballon the noted Canadian pianist will play for an unseen audience that stretches from the Maritimes to the foothills of the Rockies by way of Detroit. The United States will be linked as well on this occasion.

The Toronto Symphony orchestra under Luigi Von Kunlis in the fifth of its series of twenty-five concerts will play Wagner's Flying Dutchman, The Allegretto from Beethoven's seventh and several of other numbers, Miss Ballon, a native of Montreal first appeared before the public at the age of three and a half, one year later, practically an infant she won a scholarship at the McGill University Conservatory of Music, where she studied and won numerous other prizes. She studied in New York under Josef Hofman, Jonathan and Sachans and won a high position in the pianistic world through many public appearances with such prominent organizations as the New York Philharmonic, New York Symphony, the Metropolitan Opera and the Vienna and Berlin orchestras, as well as in recitals in musical circles of both Europe and America.

SPEAKS ENTHUSIASTICALLY OF WINTER FAIR - The largest attendance of any two days in the history of the exhibition featured the Amherst Fair on Monday and Tuesday nights, Mr. W. R. Shaw of the Provincial Agricultural Department told The Guardian yesterday on return from attending the show. The exhibition of livestock was characterized by wonderful quality, and the judges commented very favourably on the Maritime Provinces in livestock work. Island breeders were prominent as usual in the winnings. Two outstanding triumphs were secured in the Ayrshire classes when McRae Bros. Canada won the male championship on their aged bull while George Boswell won a similar honour in the female section. Other Island breeders also won distinction. A feature of the show was the large number of boys and girls present representing cattle, swine and poultry clubs throughout the Maritime provinces. These youngsters were prominently featured in the show.

RUBY P. WILL CAMPAIGN ON NEW TRACKS W. H. Keys Sells Game Little Mare, Bred in Fredericton, Nov. 14 - Ruby P. 2043-4, star pacer of Will H. Keys' stable the last three seasons on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit, since sold to new ownership in Cape Breton has been announced in 1930 will be racing on the most easterly tracks in all Canada.

The little strawberry roan mare which paced the fastest fourth heat ever recorded over a half mile track when she took her mark at Fredericton in September, 1927, is now 12 years old, but she is eligible to the 2.11 class, and when she is at her best she is regarded as capable of out-racing any horse now owned in Cape Breton.

Bred in Saskatchewan, a daughter of Symbol P., which traces in the direct male line to Electioneer, Ruby P. carries the brand of the range, and before she came Down East she went through some decidedly long and trying campaigns over western tracks, which, if she could repeat, would be just what would make her the pacing queen of Cape Breton, where they start to race on May 24 and continue uninterruptedly until the late fall.

Ruby P. has been owned by Mr. Keys in partnership with S. A. Wathen, of Port Fairfield, Me., and she has raced against all the best horses that have been on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit the past three seasons. Concluding her regular campaign this year she paced a mile in 2.08 under the electric lights at Houlton, Me., on September 25, this being the fastest mile ever paced under artificial light on a half mile track. Later she raced at Brockton Fair and at Topsham, Me., her last season performances being her best in 1929; in fact she was late in rounding into form this year because of an injury in early season training. No more popular little mare ever raced on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit than Ruby P., and with her courageous, stout-hearted fighting battles she seldom disappointed her followers.

While there is some reluctance on the part of the sellers to say much about the sale of Ruby P., it is understood that she was bought by Billy Hood, who has been driving on Cape Breton tracks for several years, for a patron in North Sydney. The several towns in Cape Breton have been importing fast record pacers during the past year, some of them being community owned and others privately owned.

In this way Lambert Todd, 2.02 1/4, Pale Pace, 2.03 1/4, and other former Grand Circuit stars have made the long journey to Canada's most easterly racing circuit, where the freer-for-all the past season attracted crowds ranging from 3,500 up to 7,000 or 8,000 people with every indication that the intense rivalry will be continued next season when Ruby P. will probably not be the only newcomer to appear. Ruby P.'s new owner is reported to be Mrs. Ballard, a well-known sportswoman in Cape Breton.

It is understood that Mr. Keys plans to replace Ruby P. with a new fast record pacer for his 1930 campaign on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit.

Purchased New Trotter Triple Week End Bill At Capitol

Albert Quigley, St. Peters, has purchased from George MacDonald, Boston, the bay trotter, Bob Kenworthy 2.18 1/4 by Atlantic Express, 2.07 cam by San Francisco. "Bob" is one of the best bred trotters in the world. He is a half-brother of the world's champion trotting mare, Nedda, 1.58 1/4, his dam being a half sister of the sensational pacing gelding Sarnado 1.59 3-4, thus giving him on both his sires and dam's sides two minute performers. He raced twice this year, getting second in both races. In his last start he was second to Tom Thumb beating such horses as Worthy Express, 2.10 1/4, Larry Moore 2.11 3-4. He should make a real trotter for his new owner who is the capable secretary of St. Peter's race track.
