

—The latest news, first of all.

—Miss Ina Gillan and Miss Pearl McLaughlin, City, who have been visiting at O'Leary and West Prince returned home yesterday.

—Thos M. Slivey, representing the \$11,000 prize contest of the Halifax Herald, The Charlottetown Guardian, and other papers, arrived in Summerside last evening.

In Summerside yesterday dealers were paying from seventeen to eight cents a lb for butter, fourteen cents a doz for eggs, forty-one cents a bus for white oats and forty-three cents a bus for black.

—Mrs H. A. Compton, Summerside, returned last evening from Moncton. She was accompanied on her return by her daughter-in-law, Mrs Frank Compton, who will spend a few days visiting in Summerside.

A box of clothing for the sufferers from the Campbell fire is being made up in Summerside. The collector of customs, post-master, or any of the officials of the buildings, will gladly receive any clothing sent to them.

In Alberton yesterday dealers were paying thirty-six cents a bus for oats, fifteen to seventeen cents a lb for butter, fourteen and one-half cents a doz for eggs, twenty-three cents a lb for wool and six cents a lb for hides.

The gasoline yacht Ahola with the owner, N. B. McKelvie, and a party of friends on board arrived in Summerside, about six o'clock yesterday morning after a tour around the island. The Ahola left Summerside on Wednesday last and the trip included calls at Charlottetown, Souris and Malpeque, leaving the latter place at four p. m., Monday afternoon. The Ahola encountered a storm on Monday night last when off West Point.

Another very heavy thunder and lightning storm accompanied by an immense downpour of rain passed over Summerside and vicinity on Monday night last. The lightning was very vivid and seemingly coming from all parts of the sky. At North Belvedere the barn of Robert Baker was struck during the storm but was not badly damaged. During the storm of Monday afternoon a new barn belonging to Jas Murphy, Seaview, was struck and badly damaged. The corner posts and a number of beams being completely knocked out of place.
