The Work Before The Interprovincial Conference

(Special to the Guardian.) OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—It has been intimated in dispatches which have appeared in the eastern Canadian papers that the British Columbia representatives will demand a drastic review of the Constitution at the Interprovincial Conference which opens tomorrow. This is in accordance with local announcements. Two of the items on the British Columbia agenda, the return of railway lands and increase of subsidies, do not in spirit effect the B. N. A. Act at all, because it is really a matter of financial relations which the Dominion Parliament may adjust without any reference to the Imperial Parliament. In 1907, Sir Wilfrid Laurier did ask the Imperial authorities to confirm by legislation the recommendation made by the Interprovincial Conference of 1906, at which Sir Richard McBride received an additional allowance of \$1,000,000 for the Province, but it was not really necessary. Sir Wilfrid's object was thereby to reach some sort of finality in the adjustment of subsidies, but as Sir Richard objected to British Columbia being prevented from re-opening the case for a settlement which would not only be a substantial recognition of their claims, but would have no limit as to time, and the objectionable phrase, "final and unalterable," was expunged, leaving the way open for British Columbia to renew her demands. But the re-definition of the respective powers of taxation by the provinces and the Dominion, and review of responsibilities in respect of education, health and transportation are other matters entirely. They impinge on the scope of the constitution itself, and if objected by the Dominion, even though unanimously supported by the provincial representatives, it would not be possible to have any such programme carried into effect.

In this connection, there is one thing to bear in mind that there are three parties to the B. N. A. Act, which is a contractual agreement, or treaty, between the provinces

and the Dominion—the Dominion, the provinces and the Imperial Parliament. It goes without saying that if the Dominion and the provinces in conference should unanimously agree to a certain revision of the constitution, and resolutions were passed by the Dominion Parliament, which includes the Senate, praying the Imperial Parliament to confirm them by Imperial enactment such consent would immediately be given. Or if the provinces and the Dominion should unanimously agree to petition the Imperial Parliament that Canada should have the right to change its own constitution at will, the same thing would happen. But the obstacle in the way of change is that there must be unanimity as a condition precedent. It is known at present that Premiers Ferguson and Taschereau, and the attitude of the Maritime Provinces may almost be assumed as in accordance, are utterly opposed to changes. The French-Canadian delegation in Parliament, in particular, are extremely jealous of the province of Quebec already enjoys and has always enjoyed a Confederation of its minority rights, and are ever suspicious of the motives involved in any proposed change, and will not permit the possibility of opening flood gates that might swamp it. The Hon. Ernest Lapointe last session, when the report of the Imperial Conference was being discussed in Parliament, gave no uncertain warning as to the position which Quebec would take in the matter. Therefore, those who have anticipations of anything very radical or anything at all happening at the Interprovincial Conference in the way of constitutional changes will be disappointed.

What may happen will be certain adjustments in respect of individual provinces or sections of Canada, which will in no way effect the federal compact or the working of the B. N. A. Act. British Columbia, the Middle West, and Prince Edward Island have certain demands and grievances to air. British Columbia wants the return of the railway lands, a confirmation of the subsidies, a principle in effect, which was recognized by the Interprovincial Conference in 1906, but so imperfectly as to be unsatisfactory. If B. C. were entitled to \$100,000 per annum for ten years, on account of physical conditions which greatly increased the local cost of administration, as compared with that of other provinces, logically she was entitled to it in perpetuity, because the physical contour can never be changed. The mountains are eternal. The Middle West wants the return of her natural resources. Prince Edward Island has certain grievances not remedied by the Duncan report. These are difficult to define, but relate to its rather disadvantageous position in Confederation, which has been the subject of a good deal of negotiation between that province and the Dominion, and on account of which during the Borden regime the Island got \$100,000 per annum additional subsidy. There are other matters more or less common to all, old age pensions, rural credits, reduction of excise duties collected by the Dominion on spirits and malt liquors, which are admittedly abnormally high and an incentive to bootlegging. Provincial rights in water power, and possibly appeals to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. In connection with the return of railway lands to B. C., which is at present the subject of a Royal Commission, as no date has been yet set for the adjourned hearing in Ottawa, it is quite on the tapis that date has been left open in order to ascertain the will of the Conference. If it should be agreed to by that body, the necessity for continuing the argument would cease, and that would be a very easy and satisfactory way out of what otherwise might have had indeterminate results.

Hon. Mr. Dunning denies that he intends to resign, and also states that his relations with Sir Henry Thornton "had been most harmonious." The "harmony" is no doubt truly described in the past tense. That these two high officials are openly opposed to each other in regard to making the Hudson Bay Railway a part of the National system has not been denied by either of them. That Mr. Dunning does not intend to resign is quite consistent with any plan he may have in mind to bring about the resignation or removal of Sir Henry.
