CAT TURNS ON GAS, KILLING A WOMAN.
NEW YORK, July 19—In searching for food a black cat accidentally disconnected a rubber tube from the gas stove in the apartment of Misses Margaret and Helen Henry, two aged spinners, who lived on the first floor of the flat house at No. 535 Sterling place, Brooklyn, some time between Monday at midnight and yesterday morning. The onrush of escaping gas asphyxiated Margaret Henry, while her sister lies dangerously ill in the Swedish Hospital, having been revived by the ambulance surgeon.
The police found pieces of meat on top of the gas stove. Evidently the cat had jumped onto the stove and taken some of the meat. A switch of the cat's tail, say the police, would have detached the gas tube. The animal was found dead on the floor beneath the stove and there was a piece of meat close to its mouth.
The dead woman was seventy-six years old and her sister is eighty-six. They have been regarded as eccentric by their neighbors. Their apartments contain little furniture and the sisters have taken special delight in caring for and feeding stray animals.
The Misses Henry were regarded in the neighborhood as being well off financially and lived from the income of an estate left them. A niece, Mrs. Clara Williams, resides at No. 1,238 Pacific street.
