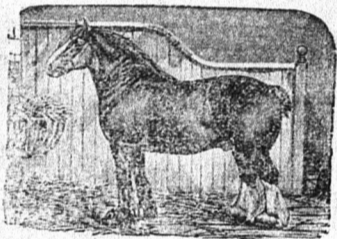

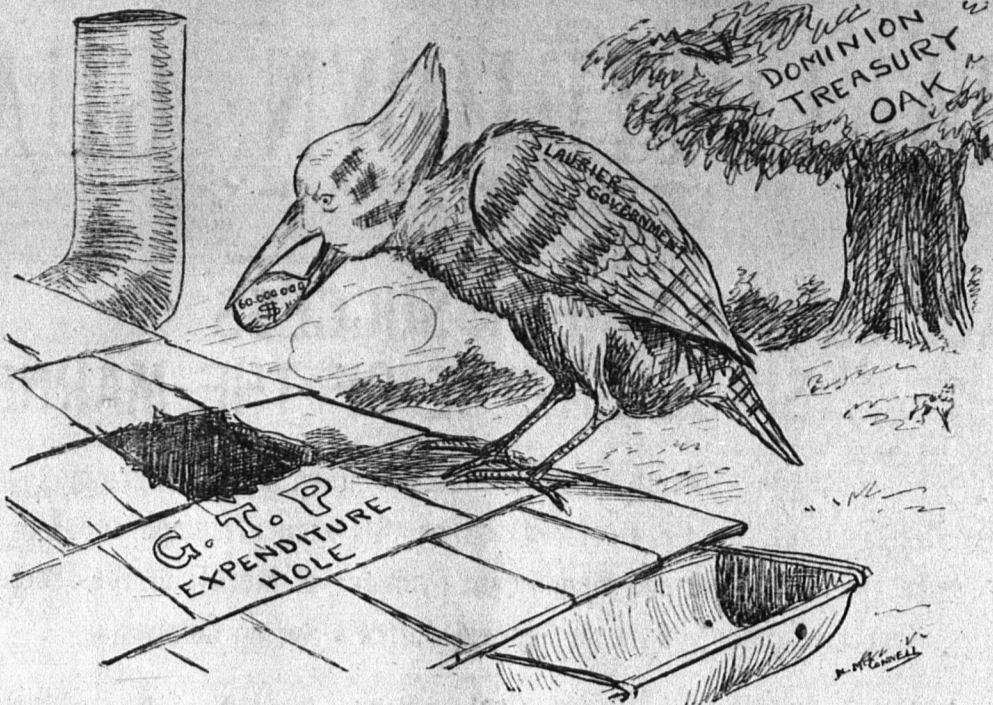

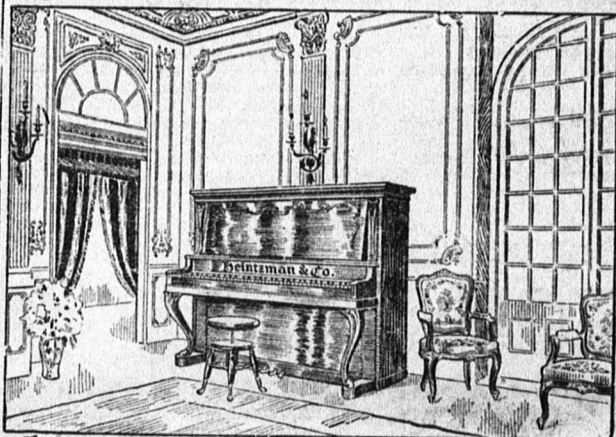

LONDON, May 10.—Between 200 to 300 British members of the Stock Exchange have mobilized to prevent forcibly, if necessary, the entry of any Germans who might be brave enough to attempt to make their way into the house in disregard of the warning issued by the stock exchange committee advising them to remain away.

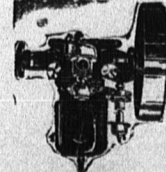
