Identity Of Cancer Patient Not Revealed

HELSINKI, Jan. 13.—(Reuters)—Prof. Elis Berven, Sweden's leading cancer specialist, said on his arrival here tonight from Moscow that he had been treating "one of the Soviet Union's marshals."

Asked if his patient was Marshal Stalin, the professor replied: "No but I cannot disclose the identity of my patient."

Berven indicated his patient's military specialty was armored warfare, saying he was "a marshal of the tank corps."

Only one Soviet tank corps marshal, Marshal Pavel Alexievich Rotmistrov, is known in Finland. Marshal Rotmistrov, 48, was one of the foremost Soviet experts in tank warfare in the Second World War.

Berven explained he had undertaken not to disclose the identity of his patient, but said: "He is suffering from a relatively unusual form of skin cancer and it was decided at a conference which I had with Russian doctors that the radiol treatment he was

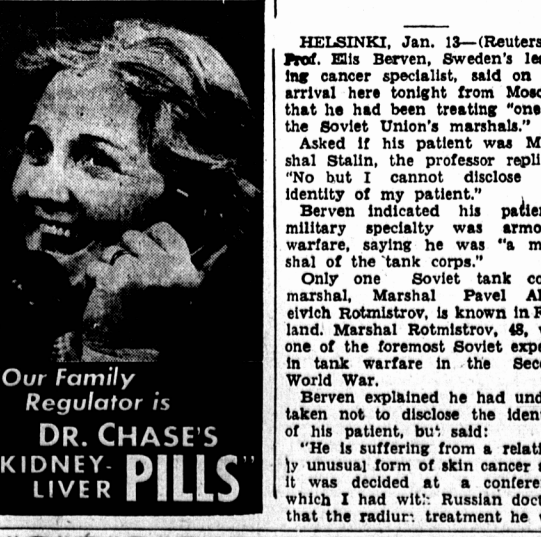
