8 Matches Are Played In Opening Week-End Prize Bonspiel Saturday

The City Hockey League, after laying dormant for the past two weeks, got its action again on Tuesday night when the Collegians with one game under their belts tangle with the Navy boys in a game that is expected to produce fireworks from start to finish.

Despite the holiday season between Christmas and New Year's both squads that will take to the ice on Tuesday night have had several practice sessions in the interim. In fact, so keen has been the interest among some of the players that one member of the Collegians travelled from Murray River just for the purpose of taking part in the practice session concerned.

That of course is the only example that has come to our notice but it shows conclusively how keen the boys are about the league and with enthusiasm that is noted it just has to be taken for granted that the coming cycle of the league is bound to prove even more successful than the short cycle that was in operation before the advent of Christmas.

That the fans have missed the games during the layoff is well noted when one takes into consideration the number of inquiries received during the past two weeks.

Daily we were asked as to when the league would resume operations and although disappointment was usually expressed when told it would be on the 9th of January nevertheless it was easy to see that those in question would be in attendance.

Tomorrow night's game will be the second start for Johnny Squaresbriggs' Collegians but fans have not forgotten the showing they made on their first start and that was when they were ousted against the current leaders of the league here, Pete Kelly's No. 2 A.N.S. squad.

On that occasion the untired and untalented college boys gave their supporters plenty to enthuse over even though defeated in the end. But for practically the entire game they proved just what good as their Air Force opponents and fans who witnessed that opening encounter are still very much in doubt as to what the final outcome would have been had not the Collegians drawn a penalty that put the Johnny Squaresbriggs' team into two corners that gave them their victory.

During the league layoff the squad has practiced consistently and their hard-working efforts have started to show results, so much so that a waxy improv team will jump over the boards tomorrow night against the combined college teams. And who knows that they may furnish a big upset—and to the minds of many it will be a big one—by facing the members of the Johnny Squaresbriggs' coached crew.

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Canadiens Whip Chicago By 10-1 Score

DETROIT, Jan. 7 (AP)—The Canadiens' spectacular comeback Saturday night gave Detroit Red Wings a 10-1 victory over their national hockey league "cousins," Toronto Maple Leafs.

The triumph was Detroit's fifth in six starts against Leafs this year, the real ending in a draw. It kept Canadiens' lead in the league. The Canadiens' comeback was a two-point edge by smothering Chicago Black Hawks 10-1 at Montreal.

Venerable Earl Selbert, obtained last week in a player deal with Chicago, celebrated his initial appearance in Detroit uniform by scoring the first goal on a neat passout from behind the Toronto net by Mud Bruneteau. The great defenseman gave an outstanding performance frustrating a determined Leafs attack thereafter.

A crowd of 12,384 looked on.

Soviet Magazine Takes Issue With News Freedom Plan

LONDON, Jan. 7 (CP)—The Soviet magazine, "Pravda," has published an open letter disagreeing with the world freedom of the press campaign inaugurated by Kent Cooper, executive director of The Associated Press, a CBS broadcast from Moscow said yesterday.

George Moorad of CBS, in a broadcast heard here by the Soviet Monitor, reported that the magazine's letter to Mr. Cooper said, in effect, "you mind your own business and we will mind ours."

F. D. R. Calls On U. S. To Close Ranks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (CP)—President Roosevelt has called upon Congress and the United States to close the ranks in total effort in "this most critical phase of the war."

He did this in his annual report "on the state of the nation," an 8,000-word message read by clerks at a joint session of the new Congress Saturday, and summarized it personally in a half-hour broadcast last night.

The President renewed his vain request last year for a National Service Act, called for Congressional action to guarantee that every person "selected for military service—the United States 4,000,000 4-F's—is utilized in the war effort in some way and called for granting of trained nurses for army service. He promised a later report for universal peacetime military training and asked Congress to plan for co-operative private and public enterprise to provide 60,000 post-war jobs.

The message had little detail of foreign relations planning for those clamoring for such detail. But he urged the people to be patient, to abandon delusions that any nation is perfect, and to avoid "made in Germany" efforts to divide the Allies.

He pledged the United States to continued co-operation with the Allies, not only for victory but for a peace that will be enduring, and for the settlement of political differences in line with "the principles in which we believe and for which we have fought."

Mr. Roosevelt asserted in his message to Congress: "This new year of 1945 can be the greatest year of achievement in human history."

"1945 can see the final ending of the Nazi-Fascist reign of terror in Europe."

"1945 can see the closing in of the forces of retribution about the centre of the malignant power of Imperialistic Japan."

"Most important of all—1945 can see the substantial beginning of the organization of world peace. It must be the justification of all the sacrifices that have been made."

The President carried the same appeal to the people in his broadcast. It followed the same general plan as the longer version, with emphasis on foreign affairs.

"The theme in the field: 'We need the continuing friendship of our Allies in this war, indeed, that need is a matter of life and death. And we shall need that friendship in the peace.'"

Swiss Feel U.S. Hit Below Belt

BERN, Jan. 7 (AP)—The United States is considered by many people in Switzerland today to have hit below the belt in its attack on Swiss commerce with Germany.

According to the newspaper Basler Nachrichten, the Swiss feel that 132,000,000 people are unjustly picking on their nation of 4,000,000.

State Secretary Stettinius' statement that the question of Swiss exports was being re-examined created surprise in Switzerland. Anger and resentment followed the publication in the Neue Zuercher Zeitung of a Washington dispatch quoting an American correspondent (overseas) that Switzerland was a nation of "vultures."

The Magazine took the position, Moorad said, that the Russians "do not insist upon their type of press in the bourgeois countries, and they do not expect our ideas on freedom to be thrust upon Russia."

Mr. Cooper has been campaigning to insure free access to news at its sources throughout the world, together with equal transmission rates for all, as a means of promoting international understanding and averting future wars.

He has proposed, also, that free press clauses be written into the coming peace treaties, with the same aims in view.
