## SEES NEW ERA

(Continued from Page 1)

"It is now contended that, under the policy of the present government to have a trans-continental highway, a large part of which is already built, Prince Edward Island will be made part of the trans-continental system, and that logically the Strait will be part of the trans-continental highway, as will also the approaches to the ferry, and that in order to be on a par with other provinces we shall be charged no toll for the use of this highway. There is no such other toll as between other provinces.

### Car Ferry Accounting

"There has been mention made in the Press that some fear was expressed under the new ruling by which expenses of the car ferry and new piers are to be charged to the consolidated revenues of Canada, that we may be penalized, on account of the large amount involved in upkeep, in other votes pertinent to the province, continued Judge Arsenault. There is absolutely no argument in this. For many years previous to the inauguration of the car ferry service there was a large vote each year for maintaining a service between the Island and the mainland, including a subsidy for the steam navigation company. It was never urged that on this account other votes should be lessened or cut out. The car ferry is a national work which serves not only Prince Edward Island, but also the whole of Canada, United States and the world. It is the means by which other points in the world trade with us, and we trade with them to material advantage. There have been other national works such as the canal system of Ontario built at the cost of hundreds of millions of dollars of Canadian money, the ports of Montreal, Quebec, St. John and Halifax, all of which have required immense sums of money for construction and upkeep. It has never been urged that those provinces should be penalized as regards other votes pertaining to those provinces. Prince Edward Island stands in a much better position by reason of the service having been paid for by this province, making it a condition of entering into Confederation. There was contract regarding national works in other provinces. Why should we be penalized by reason of the Dominion Government keeping faith with us in the matter of keeping contracts regarding communication?"

### Unfair Discrimination

It was unfair to Prince Edward Island Judge Arsenault maintained, that the Railway management should have to charge up expenses in connection with this work to the railway. "In all matters pertaining to improvement in communication we were always met with the excuse that such improvements would further increase the cost to the railway. The railway, naturally not concerned with the Confederation contract, had to be run on a purely business basis, irrespective of the Confederation contract. Now the necessary improvements can be made without the Railway having to consider this excuse. "Prince Edward Island is a province of the Dominion and as such, although small is entitled to the same rights and privileges as larger provinces of Canada. We are entitled to continuous communication with the railway system of Canada. These communications cannot be regarded in the light of what existed at the time of Confederation, but in the light of modern means of transportation. We are rightly entitled to daily communication, including Sunday service, and such comforts of travel as pulman cars as other provinces enjoy. We are entitled to have passenger cars transferred to the car ferry without the inconvenience of getting off the train, onto the boat, and into the cars again. It is a serious hardship especially with women and children, and particularly for the sick going to and coming from hospitals abroad.

### Railway Sympathetic

"All these disadvantages and inconveniences must be remedied. It may take a little time, but we cannot be side-tracked. Our pride as a province cannot be further humiliated by putting up with service unequal to that enjoyed by other Provinces. We must prevail in the end. The railway management, recognizing our arguments, are in sympathy, and in my opinion we have entered into a new era of transportation. Speaking

ed up: Poland, 200,000; Rumania, 150,000, and Czechoslovakia, 100,000. Russia would have 500,000 men.

The British plan also provided for extending the London Naval Treaty to include France and Italy. It also extended the naval holiday on capital ships to all powers except Italy, which would be permitted to build one ship to balance the new French cruiser Dunkirk.

Germany would be freed legally from the naval restrictions imposed by the Treaty of Versailles, but actually her naval power would be fixed at the present level until 1936.

The arms treaty proposed by the British would remain in force five years. During that period special international commissioners would be created to attempt to settle the political problems now disturbing Europe. A second general arms conference would be held before the expiration of the five year period.

Mr. MacDonald also suggested limitation of military aircraft, giving these specific figures:—United States, 500 airplanes; Great Britain, 500; France, 500; Japan, 500; Italy, 500; and fewer planes for other countries. He did not suggest a maximum for Germany. Under the restrictions of the Treaty of Versailles, now in force, the Germans may not have either military airplanes or submarines.

**ROME, May 21**—The world-wide depression has been felt by the Vatican. The volume of Peter's Pence has been reduced and a great amount of money lost abroad in investments made overseas. Economy is, therefore, being practised and a circular has been issued to employees in the Vatican City informing them their pay will have to be reduced by between 10 and 20 percent.

## AMERICANS WIN ALL FIVE TILTS

### Wright & Nunn Lose in Final Singles Encounters Saturday.

**MONTREAL, May 21**—(C.P.)—Members of the United States Davis Cup Team today were enroute to Washington after disposing of Canada in the North American zone final in five straight victories. The Americans climaxed their complete sweep of the series by taking the two final singles on Saturday, Ellsworth Vines, United States and Wimbledon champion, defeating Dr. Jack Wright of Vancouver, and Wilmer Allison the United States, captain, conquering Gilbert Nunn of Toronto. Dr. Wright forced the tall lanky Vines to extend himself in order to chieve a 7-5, 6-3, 7-5 win. Although the match was not spectacular, Nunn put up a good fight against Allison who triumphed 6-4, 8-6, 6-4.

## KING O'CONNOR IS WINNER OF KING'S PLATE

### Seagram Stable Entry Races Home Ahead of Field of 22 at Woodbine Park Saturday.

**TORONTO, May 21** — Seagram Stable, once home for some of Canada's most outstanding thoroughbreds today had regained the most historic racing trophy in America—the King's plate. In a sweeping drive that left no doubt as to his ability for speed, King O'Connor, four-year-old bay gelding raced home at Woodbine Park Saturday afternoon to beat an unwieldy field of 22 Ontario-bred, three-year-olds and up that hadn't scored a victory since turning three, and captured for the Canary and Gold Seagram colors the 50 guineas donated by the King with \$7,500 added. Harry Hatches' Eastern Hatter, carrying top weight of 132 pounds was three lengths behind followed by Mrs. E. Webster's gallant little gelding, Syngo.

## HOOP CHAMPS OWE SUCCESS TO UNKNOWN

**VICTORIA, May 21**—(C.P.)—How Victoria Blue Ribbons, crowned champions of Canadian senior basketball with their recent victory over Windsor-Walkerville Alumni, solved the Alumni's famous "screening play," chief factor in the Ribbons' win, now has been told.

An anonymous letter-writer, a "well-wisher," explained the play to "Chuck" Chapman, captain of the Victoria team, and gave an idea of how to combat it. The letter advised the team not to be drawn out from under the basket. Accordingly, the Ribbons' plans were changed and Chapman was appointed to remain under the hoop.

"Chuck" credits the Ribbons' success in the title series to the writer of the letter, who signed merely a "well-wisher." The letter was received after the first game, which the Ribbons lost to the Alumni.

French amendment, but the Germans now have withdrawn these.

The pact as it now stands consists of five articles instead of the original six. It is somewhat longer however, than the original form since the moot points, such as revision of treaties, needed ampler statement so as to produce no mistaken interpretation. The present pact begins with a preamble stating its purpose as collaboration among the four great western European powers to maintain peace.

### Based On Briand-Kellogg Pact

It states it is based on the Briand-Kellogg pact and the non-resort to force agreement signed at Geneva last December, and the Covenant of the League of Nations. The League Covenant is not specifically mentioned in the original form of the pact. The present pact makes it abundantly clear that the four-power agreement does not mean the powers will impose a solution on any other nation. Prime Minister MacDonald stated this verbally when he was in Rome but developments abroad showed some of the peoples desired a more definite statement. The pact now states this point clearly and beyond question. On the difficult point of revision of treaties, the pact states definitely the possibility of accomplishing this but only through the machinery of the League of Nations under article 19 of the Covenant. The original pact also mentioned the league in this connection but owing to misunderstanding abroad the present draft restates this point more strongly.

### MacDonald Plan Included

To this Signor Mussolini agreed, but this meant writing disarmament into the pact in great detail. Moreover the big powers are now agreeing to the MacDonald plan at Geneva and this makes it unnecessary to include it in the Mussolini pact. The pact in its present form is very general in phraseology, not entering into details.

Some of its general characteristics are: First it is a restatement of previous accords for international collaboration. Second it is very careful not to mention either the necessity or the desirability of revision of treaties, although admitting the possibility of revision. Third, it is longer than the original pact; article two, referring to treaty revision, is particularly long, the articles contain more conditions.

Both British and French diplomatic circles were greatly pleased tonight at the optimistic turn affairs have taken. M. De Jouvenel the French Ambassador, is a newspaper publisher who came to Rome on a six months assignment for the declared purpose of bringing France and Italy closer together,
