Minced ham and chopped green pepper, mixed with mayonnaise spread between griddle bread slices make a fine sandwich—add a crisp lettuce leaf, of course.

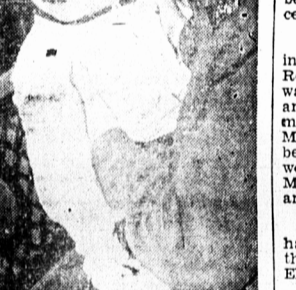
Miss Sally Forbes entertained at a party for a number of her friends on Friday evening.
