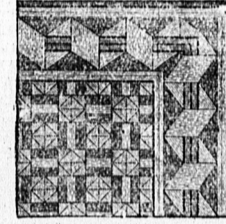

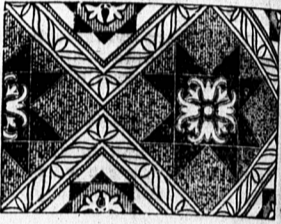

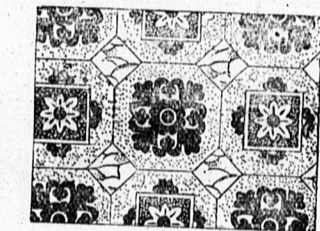
### COAT FROCKS HAVE CAPES.

## Veteran Runner Won Boston Marathon

**BOSTON, April 19.**—The legs, the head and the heart of Clarence H. DeMar, of Melrose, are still the best of those embodied in the country's long distance runners. The man of 35 years who, as a soldier back from the war, surprised sports followers last year by winning the American Marathon road race in record time eleven years after his first success in the event, won it again today. His time of 2 hours, 23 minutes, 47 3-5 seconds, set no new mark, but it was nearly two minutes faster than that of the runner-up Frank Zuna of the Millrose A. A., New York, and his victory established him as the only man in the 27 years history of this race to win it three times.

Today's was a contest in which veterans triumphed. Five of the first eleven men were previous winners, and most of those well placed have been running for years. Zuna won in 1921, Carl W. A. Linder, Boston A. A., in 1919; Will Linder, Boston A. A., in 1917; Ed Kennedy, Port Chester, N. Y., in 1917, and Edward Fabre, of Montreal, in 1915.

Walle Carlson, of Chicago, brother of Fritz, who won in 1913 was third, and Albert P. Michelson, of Stamford, Conn., who contested the lead with others and then with DeMar for nearly half the race, was fourth. After Gunner Nilson and Nestor Erickson, of New York, team mates of the Pinish-American A. C. had finished fifth and sixth, there came plodding home Carl W. A. Linder, of the Boston A. A. victor in 1919, and old Bill Kennedy of Port Chester, N. Y., who led the way in 1917.

DeMar Took the Lead. Fabre was the only Canadian to place for the former home starter, Victor McAuley, of Windsor, N. S., was forced to surrender to a sprain of the ankle after eight miles of the race. He was brought to the Boston Athletic Club by automobile.

George W. Spragg the St. John, N. B. entrant did not start. The elimination of McAuley from the race was a disappointment to many, as on his performance of the race last year, he was rated as a possible runner-up. McAuley finished fourth last year and made better time than the runner-up of today, Frank Zuna.

Fabre ran a good race, starting slow, but later eating up the distance between himself and the leader consistently. At five miles he was twenty-first and at eight miles he stepped fourth. From that point on he was able to pass but

three runners. It was Fabre's seventh appearance in the Marathon. Marion Kinch, a sister, and Ella Lyndall, a friend, accompanying the remains. A short service was held at the former home of Florence Campbell on April 19th at the Presbyterian church afterwards. Rev. Mr. Christie officiating, using as a text, "And there shall be no more sorrow." Appropriate hymns were sung both home and church, and Scripture passages were read. Flowers were contributed by friends in Roxton Falls and at home were beautiful.
