Hereford Breeders Buy Alberta Bull

Final arrangements on the purchase of a 2,300-pound purebred Hereford beef bull from Nanton, Alberta, were made at a meeting of the P. E. I. Hereford Breeders Association in the Provincial Department of the Agriculture offices last night.

The animal, described as one of the finest beef bulls ever to come to the Province, was sold by Mr. W. A. Crawford Frost. Price of the animal was about \$1,200. He is expected to arrive on the Island about Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

Purchase of the animal was made through funds subscribed by shareholders together with a Provincial Government grant. All members at last night's meeting became shareholders. Value of a share is \$50.00.

times. None stood higher among his fellow Senators than Senator Sinclair. While the province mourns personally I have lost a true and loyal friend.

"It is with deep regret that I learned today of the death of Senator John E. Sinclair. For upwards of forty years I have been privileged to know him and have the benefit of his warm friendship, and for the past eleven years I have been closely associated with him in Ottawa.

"He was a top notch farmer who always made a study of scientific trends in agriculture. And he gave the same keen attention and close study to public affairs throughout his long and successful political career.

"His advice was sought by many people whom he knew and he was kind and generous with his wise counsel, both to those who were privileged to call him friend, and to those who were not so closely associated with him.

"Senator Sinclair was highly regarded in Ottawa both by his fellow Senators and by members of the House of Commons and the members of the Government. His passing leaves a vacant spot in our public life that will be difficult to fill."

From Mr. Louis O'Connor, president of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture:
"I was very much shocked to learn of the death of Senator Sinclair. This Province has lost one of its greatest public men and the Dominion Government and the Liberal Party in Prince Edward Island a wise counsel."

"All his lifetime he has been an active and keen supporter of every movement for the betterment of the general welfare of his native Province, particularly in cooperative enterprise, Credit Unions, and the Federation of Agriculture.

"I wish to extend my sincere sympathy to Mrs. Sinclair and family."
