ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Pictou harbor is now quite clear of ice.

THE mail arrived Saturday evening about a quarter after six o'clock.

THE Patten and Perry Company gave another excellent performance to a most appreciative audience at the Opera House on Saturday evening. The performance was stopped for a few minutes about ten o'clock by the electric lights going out.

THE blades were placed on the Minto as she lay at the east side of the Railway wharf Pictou by a diver named Herrion from Halifax. The diver undertook to perform the work in ten days and it is understood the price of the contract was \$750.

GARFIELD Saunders in the employ of Charles Hermans met with a painful accident on Saturday. While nailing zinc the nail flew and struck him in the eye inflicting a painful injury. Dr. H. D. Johnson was called and he was removed to the P. E. I. Hospital.

MR. J. Sweet, the Toronto commercial traveller, suffering from smallpox in the Isolation Hospital, St. John, is improving rapidly. He has been in the suburban institution for two weeks, and it will be fully a fortnight more before he will have recovered sufficiently to be released. His case is a mild one.

THE Royal Bank of Canada which has a capital and reserve of \$5,481,000, is asking parliament for power to increase the capital by one million dollars. The general opinion is that the control of the bank will ere long pass to interests dominated by J. Pierpoint Morgan and Sir William Van Hornes.

ALEX. R. McKay, of Charlottetown, (formerly of Hardwood Hill), has sold his Hackney Stallion, "Kilwick Fire away" to breeders in Toronto. Mr. McKay was a passenger by the "Stanley" on Tuesday, with the horse, and is now on his way to Toronto to deliver the animal. It seems strange that provincial horsemen would allow such a fine animal to leave the province. There are too many mongrel stallions and not enough well-bred. —Pictou Advocate.

ON Tuesday, March 24th, a large number of relatives and friends assembled at the home of Allan and Mrs. McQuarrie, Searletown to celebrate their golden wedding. The house was appropriately decorated for the occasion, and as the supper was one calculated to suit the most epicurean tastes, peculiar to say ample justice was done thereto. The hostess welcomed her guests by an address in verse of her own excellent composition, after which several suitable recitations were given. Mrs. Smith, sister of Mrs. McQuarrie, who was her bridesmaid fifty years ago, taking the lead. The groomsmen, Mr. McLead is also still living in Charlottetown but on account of ill health was unable to be present, and a congratulatory letter from him was read before the company. The remainder of the evening was spent in games and other pleasant pastimes; until midnight, when after singing "God be with you till we meet again," and Auld Lang Syne the merry party dispersed, wishing Mr. and Mrs. McQuarrie a long continuance of their happy wedded life. Many well-wishers also paid their respects to the happy couple. Although both past the allotted three score years and ten, the honored couple are yet strong and young in heart. Of their family of five sons and five daughters, all but two daughters are living, though only three are on the Island and were enabled to be with their parents on this joyous occasion. Numerous beautiful and useful presents were received.

THE death of Charles A. Doull occurred at his home here this morning at about five o'clock after an illness of only a few days. Although feeling a little miserable the greater part of the winter Mr. Doull was able to attend to his business without any difficulty. Last week he became ill and consulted a doctor, but kept around until Saturday. On Monday a change for the worse had taken place, but neither Mr. Doull nor his friends considered him dangerous until Tuesday when the doctors held a consultation and pronounced his case "almost hopeless. Relatives and friends were at once sent for. Yesterday deceased "hovered" between life and death, but it was noticed that he was growing weaker as the day passed. The funeral service will be held Saturday afternoon at three o'clock. Chas. A. Doull was born at Summerside, P. E. I. about 45 years ago. He came to Sackville twenty years or more ago, and went into partnership with his brother, John W. who was running a wood working factory in what is now the S. W. Copp factory. Later the firm dissolved and Charles built the factory now owned by Copp and Co and carried on the wood working business with Mr. Dickie of Dorchester. A few years later Mr. Doull gave up his business and effected a furniture store and general repair shop near his residence, Bridge street. This was afterwards moved to the present site on the Allison lot, and greatly enlarged and improved. The deceased was an active, energetic citizen and one who took a deep interest in the welfare of the town. He was a member of the Methodist church here and for some time has been manager of the choir. His sudden and untimely death has come as a profound shock to the entire community.
