The next of kin is informed by telegraph. 3. Delivery of telegram to next of kin is confirmed. 4. Letters of regret are issued with pamphlet. 5. The chaplain is notified. 6. The Pensions Commission, Administrator of Estates, Dependents' Allowance Board and Assigned Pay Branch are notified. 7. The Minister for Air issues a card of regret. 8. A letter is sent at the third month to the next of kin to report any further developments. 9. A letter is sent at the fourth month. 10. Presumption of death is noted. 11. After the man is missing for five and a half months, he is presumed dead and notice to that effect is sent to the next of kin. Hon. C. G. Power, M. C. Minister for Air, in making sure all available advice is given without delay to the family of the missing boy, has done a very good job. The Coal And Industrial Future

Carbonising industries are the gas industry, coke-oven and low-temperature carbonisation industries. Since 1918, the British gas industry has concentrated on the production of gas for heating. Continuous research, especially during the last twenty years, has increased the general efficiency and has made possible the production of an enormous range of by-products. A huge range of new raw materials for industry has been released. As a result of these developments, it is becoming common to find oneself using a great variety of articles in industry and in the home—from perfumes, dyes and anti-septics to telephones, ashtrays, parts of furniture and aspirins without realising that they are made from coal.

Other indirect products of coal are: Urea and acetone, the latter being the basis of synthetic rubber and acetate rubber; nylon used for artificial silk stockings, toothbrushes, etc. Plastics have a great range of uses—electric light fittings, non-ferrous door fittings, decorative panels and surfacing for tubes and other furniture. Further uses are for making laminated material for aircraft fuselages, instrument panels and other aircraft fittings, gears, wheels, trolley wheels, etc. Perfumes, essences and flavourings. Several hundreds of these are in use, including those formerly obtained from plants and animals. They include vanilla, cinnamon, artificial musks; essence of bitter almonds; and tannin, used for dyes and other purposes. These include naphthalene, phenol and other tar products for disinfectants and synthetic resins and lampblack.
