

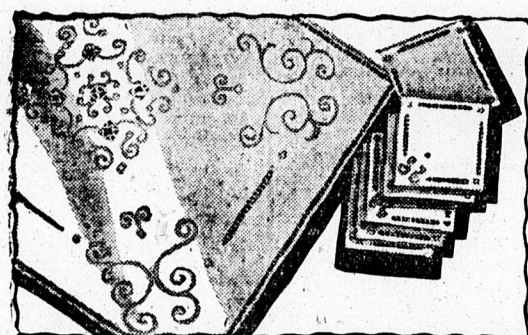

Extradition Is Denied Giovanni
 MONTREAL, Nov. 17—(CP)—Chief Justice Greenshields of the Superior Court has denied application by the Italian Government for extradition of Gassisi Giovanni on a charge of murder said to have been committed in 1921.

At least half of the so-called proof of crime, submitted on behalf of the Italian Government to get Giovanni back to his native land, was made up of hearsay evidence, insufficient to justify the prisoner's extradition, Justice Greenshields said.
 According to information given the court, the murder for which Giovanni was apprehended was connected with a family feud. In September, 1921, Schiro Giovanni was killed and footprints near the scene of the crime were made by a horse which had belonged to Gassisi Giovanni's police charged. He was arrested and acquitted later leaving the country, but in 1927 another warrant was issued for his arrest, charging him with "moral complicity in the murder of Schiro."

In Memoriam
 MR. JOHN D. MACLEOD
 (Amherst News Nov. 17)
 Death occurred at Highland View Hospital on Monday evening at 6 o'clock of John D. MacLeod, after a short illness of heart trouble.
 Born in 1868, a native of Murray Harbour, P. E. I., he followed the sea in his younger days, and was a deep sea captain. He was also in the Canadian Expeditionary forces during the war. The family resided in Tignish for a number of years, and are well known in that community.
 Captain MacLeod spent a number of years in the Klondyke, and during the gold rush of 98 he had the distinction of being the first white man to rise the White Horse Rapids. He was in California for ten years, returning to Amherst about a year ago.
 He was well read, and his extensive travels to all parts of the world made him a very interesting conversationalist. He was a man of high principles, and was respected by all who had the privilege of knowing him.
 He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Lucy Ferguson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Ferguson of Southport, P. E. I., three sons, Harry of Arlington, Mass., Jack of Malden, Mass. and Edward of Newark, N. J., and two daughters, Mrs. Graham Cooke of Amherst, and Mrs. Fred Young of Hamilton, Ont. There is also one brother, Daniel in Lubec, Maine.
 The funeral which was largely attended, was held from Furlong's Funeral Home, Thursday afternoon at 2.30. Rev. T. B. McDormand of the first Baptist Church had charge of the service. The choir, with Mrs. Shiers as organist, sang "The Sands of Time are Sinking" and "Abide With Me". Mrs. Borden Bowles sang with much feeling "Sometime We'll Understand," and Mr. Charles Messenger sang "Crossing the Bar".
 The casket was draped with the Union Jack and members of the B. E. S. L. acted as pallbearers. They were Walter Hire, J. Ora Lamy, James Corr, Ernest Corbett, William Chisholm and William DeWitt.
 The services at the grave were in charge of the B. E. S. L. and Charles Estabrooks sounded the Last Post.
 The floral tributes were many and beautiful, testifying to the esteem held for the deceased and the deep sympathy felt for the family.

Peace Award For Former Nazi Prisoner
 NORWAY, Nov. 17—(AP)—Two Norwegian Government leaders resigned from the Nobel Peace Prize Committee, it was disclosed today, because of reliable reports the 1936 peace award would go to a Nazi concentration camp prisoner now released.
 The Committee was said reliably to have selected Karl Von Ossietzky, Anti-Fascist crusader, who has been released from a German concentration camp where he was imprisoned since February, 1933.
 First to resign from the Committee was Foreign Minister Dr. Halvdan Koht, who said he wanted to avoid any opportunity for Germany to hold the Norwegian Government responsible in any way for the award.
 Dr. Johan L. Mowinckel, former Norwegian premier now leader of the Liberal party, resigned with the explanation he could remain on the Nobel Committee in the face of Dr. Koht's stand.
 Informed sources in Stockholm said Von Ossietzky was likely to receive the prize in recognition of his general activity in behalf of peace rather than for any special work. The award, it was said, was based on his championing of a German peace movement before the advent of Hitler's Nazis to power.
 Given Liberty
 BERLIN, Nov. 17—(AP)—Liberated as no longer a "danger" to the Third Reich, frail little Karl Von Ossietzky tasted freedom tonight after three years in Nazi concentration camps.
 Nazi authorities said there were no strings attached to his release. They said he was in improved health, following his recent treatment at a hospital for heart disease. (The Havas news agency, however, said he was seriously ill of tuberculosis).

Canadian Car For The Duke of Kent
 OSHAWA, November 18—Following the example of King Edward VIII, and Lord Bessborough, former Governor-General of Canada, the Duke of Kent has selected a Canadian-built car for his personal use.
 Confirmation of the report was forthcoming in a cable received by R. S. McLaughlin, president of General Motors of Canada, Limited, and was made known by Claude Watt, advertising manager of the company.
 The cable, which was sent by Captain Hartman of Messrs. Lendrum and Hartman, McLaughlin-Buick distributors for Great Britain, read:
 "Have today delivered Canadian-built Pullman Limousine to His Royal Highness Prince George Duke of Kent—brother to His Majesty the King—who has expressed his great satisfaction with the car."
 It was also learned that Lord Bessborough took delivery of a McLaughlin-Buick car a few weeks ago. In a letter to J. A. Lano, export manager at Oshawa, A. R. Peel of Lendrum and Hartman stated that His Lordship had been keenly interested in Mr. Peel's visit to Canada early this year when King Edward's car was being built. The letter also stated that both Lord and Lady Bessborough had been inquiring about Mr. McLaughlin, whom they know personally.
 When talking to Mr. Peel, His Lordship recalled that he had congratulated Mr. "Sam" and presented him with the King's Plate Trophy in 1934, when Horometer, one of Mr. McLaughlin's horses, won the King's Plate.
 Commenting on the Duke of Kent's selection of the car, Mr. Watt said: "We in Oshawa deeply appreciate the honor His Royal Highness has conferred upon us."

Varied Opinion Expressed On Appointment
 CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Nov. 17—(CP Cable via Reuters)—The appointment of Patrick Duncan, South African Minister of Mines, as Governor General of the Union failed today to find full favor in all sections of South African opinion.
 Duncan's appointment in succession to the Earl of Clarendon was announced last night. A Scot by birth, he has lived in South Africa since the Boer War.
 The Cape Times declared a large section of the community held the view that a "cardinal blunder" had been made in departing from the principle of appointing Governors-General from overseas.
 The Johannesburg Star said there was a measure of gratification to be found in the idea of having a South African as Governor General, but added the fact it had been necessary to select a working politician showed how narrow the choice was in any Dominion.
 The Rand Daily Mail declared the services which overseas governors-general had rendered the country could not be over-estimated. The paper added, "this tradition of disinterested devotion to the Union is to be fully maintained by a distinguished South African."

Green Against Lewis Expulsion
 TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 17—(AP)—William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor, said tonight he was against convention expulsion of John L. Lewis' rebel unions.
 "The wise and best course would be for the convention to refrain from taking drastic action," Green said in an interview.
 "It is my judgment that the standing committee appointed by the executive council should continue to function, willing and ready to meet a committee from the (rebel) committee for industrial organization if that organization decides to appoint a committee."
 Green's statement was in line with word from the Federation's chief policy makers that the convention would approve the executive council's suspension of the rebels two months ago and leave the door open for further peace manoeuvres.
 If these moves reach a dead end the council by act of the convention, can revoke the rebel charters.
