Slain Recto's
Widow Accused
Double Murder

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Oct. 30.—Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, widow of the slain rector of the Episcopal Church of St. John the Evangelist, and her brother Henry Stevens, are the man and woman named in the sworn statement of Mrs. Jane Gibson, self-styled eye-witness of the double slaying of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Reinhardt Mills, on the night of September 14.

This announcement was not made by the authorities, but became known, tonight through the issuance of a statement by Mrs. Hall's attorney, Timothy N. Pfeiffer, denying the truth of Mrs. Gibson's account, and declaring that neither the rector's widow nor her brother were on the Phillips farm on the night of the double slaying.

"Mrs. Gibson's statements are contrary to the facts," Mr. Pfeiffer said. "Mrs. Hall was in home all evening, Barbara Tough, one of the maids, was out that night, and Louisa Geist the other maid, was on the back stoop. There was no one else but a little seven-year-old niece in the house with Mrs. Hall. But there may have been one visitor.

"Henry Stevens' identification as one of the quartette seen on the farm is also contrary to fact. Henry was at Lavalette, N. J., all that night."

Mrs. Gibson, in her statement, it is known, declared that she had seen four persons on the night of the murders under the crab-apple tree where two days later the bodies of the rector and the choir singer were found.

Mrs. Gibson also said in her statement that she heard the man whom she alleged saw fire a series of shots at the rector and the choir singer, addressed by his companion.

CHEAPER FREIGHT RATES ON COAL

EDMONTON, Oct. 30.—Cheaper freight rates on coal, as a form of national service, have been suggested to the management of the Canadian National Railways by A. Chard, freight and traffic superintendent for the Alberta government. The present tariff of \$12.70 per ton from Alberta mines, to points in Ontario are shown to be working seriously against the development of the eastern market. A request is therefore made that a very substantial reduction in the ton rate be put into effect on the government road in order to give an opportunity for the west to connect on the fuel question.

Another Shipment of U. S. Gold to Canada

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—The Bank of Montreal today shipped to Canada \$100,000 in gold making a total of \$17,000,000 sent to the Dominion since the beginning of October. No country in the world is in so strong a position as Canada and no country faces a brighter future said Sir Donald Mann. This morning Sir Donald and Sir William MacKenzie have just returned from a tour of England on what they described as personal business. Asked as to British business conditions Sir Donald said the recovery was slow, taxation was a great burden and British finance was not eager for speculative investments overseas but preferred gilt edged securities at home.
