British Training Invasion Troops Royal Air Force continues far pattern of violence in Germany.

LONDON, March 14.—(AP)—The Royal Air Force's powerful step-up bombing offensive spread a far pattern of violence in Germany and Holland last night and early today, and Britain disclosed that incendiary troops of its own are being equipped against the day when they may challenge the Nazis on the European continent.
