The outward cargo by the Stanley yesterday from Georgetown included two cars oats, one car machinery, one car smelts, one car fish, seven cars mixed freight. On Wednesday she brought over to Georgetown one car flour and four cars of mixed freight and thirty passengers arriving in port at ten minutes past ten.

The factory at Stanley Bridge for the past year began operation on the 3rd of June and closed on the 2nd November. Milk was furnished by 135 patrons and totalled 1,501,352 lbs. from which 148,395 lbs. of cheese were made. The quantity of milk required for a pound of cheese was 10.47 lbs, and the average quantity of butter fat for each pound obtained for the cheese was 11.7 cents and the total receipts amounted to \$16,771.33. Of this amount the milk drawers received 1,334.06, and the cost of manufacture was \$14935.83 leaving for the patrons \$267.35 in cheese and \$3,234.09 in cash. The patrons numbered 135 and Austin J. McNeill, Joseph Stewart, Robert McKay Patrick Bolger and J. W. Fyle were among the larger contributors of milk.

The Union Dairying Company held their annual meeting recently in the hall at Vernon River Bridge, quite a large number of patrons being present. The secretary gave a good, clear statement of the financial standing of the company which showed a balance on hand of thirty dollars, after all the debts had been paid. The factory began operations on June 1st and closed October 31st. Milk was supplied by seventy-nine patrons and 916,636 lbs milk were received. The average value to patrons one hundred pounds milk was ninety-two cents. This is a very creditable showing and speaks well for the manager J. H. McDonald and the salesman Wm. Jenkins. The old board of directors has been retained.

A few gentlemen interested in horse-racing have laid off a half mile track on the North River flats. The ice is about ten inches thick, and as clear and smooth as the trotter's heart can desire. The track is marked by bushes and flags. It is proposed, if horse owners will do their part, to keep the track clear all winter, but of course this cannot be done without funds. A small subscription from each will be sufficient and it is hoped that they will come forward and wipe out the stigma of being dwellers in "Sleepy Hollow" as far as horse racing is concerned. It is proposed to hold a meeting at 8 p. tonight at 176 Queen St. to arrange a day's racing; a free for all; three minute, and a two year old class are spoken of. As the heats are half mile, condition will not beeded. A half mile track, it is claimed by the promoters, is better for the horses and better for the spectators as they will be relieved of the tedious waiting so long between heats.
