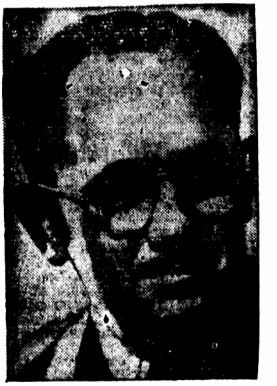

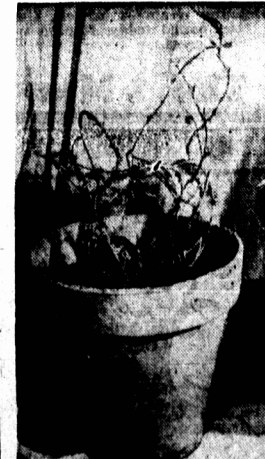

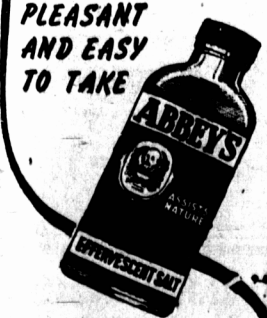
Graphic evidence of the killing power of the newly developed 2, 4-D; two plots of poison ivy are shown. The one on the left was treated with the chemical.

General conclusion of the annual meeting of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association at Toronto in February was that the phenomenal claims which were made for 2, 4-D last year are fully substantiated. A full season's research on this amazing weed killer has been completed, and 2, 4-D is about to burst on the general public this year like DDT did last year. Coming in contact with any part of a plant, the chemical is absorbed through its leaves, and within a short period of time has penetrated the plant's system, from leaf and stem to root tip. 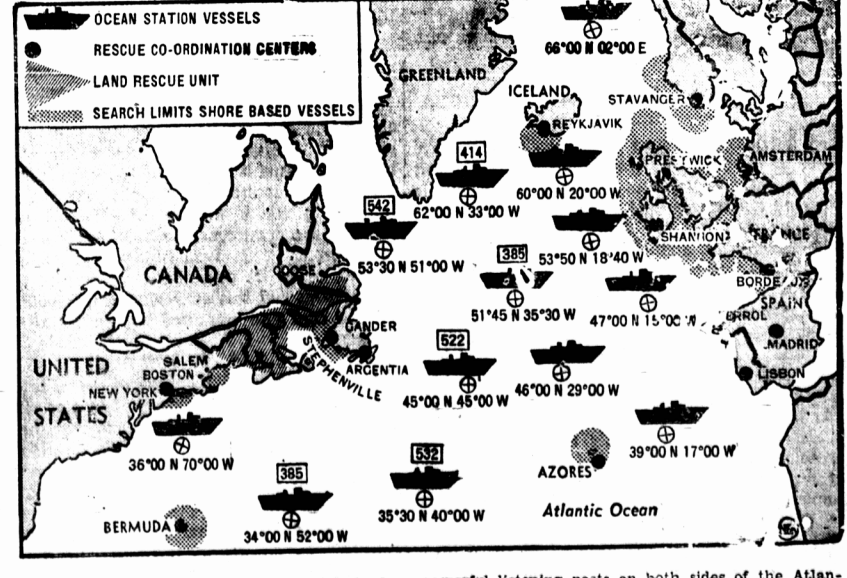

Born of an Anglo-American system set up during the war, which has functioned smoothly ever since, plans for a permanent world-wide network for air-sea rescue have just been completed by representatives of 51 nations, meeting in Paris as "PIACO"—Provisional International Civil Aviation Organization. Map above shows how the system works. Upon receiving a radioed distress signal, powerful listening posts on both sides of the Atlantic "fix" the location of survivors and the nearest co-ordination center dispatches planes and ships to the scene. Thirteen weather ships will be maintained at fixed stations. PIACO was organized with an eye to the greatly expanded post-war transoceanic travel.
