BROOKLYN DRY DOCK.

DOINGS IN TWO WARS

40 U.S. Soldiers Killed by Filipinos

WITH THEIR OFFICERS

Botha's Attack Repulsed and Boer Commandant Offerman Killed.

OVER 40 U. S. SOLDIERS KILLED. MANILA, Sept. 30.—(Special).—Over 40 men of Company G, Ninth Infantry were killed by the insurgents in a fight at Balangie.

SURPRISED BUT SOLD THEIR LIVES DEARLY. The officers were all killed. They were attacked by over 400 Balcongers and many were killed while unprepared and many in their tents.

ABOUT 140 OF THE ATTACKERS WERE SLAIN. BOERS UNDER BOTHA REPULSED. DURBAN, Sept. 30.—(Special).—A force of 1,500 Boers under Botha attacked Poritalla, fighting all day of the 26th.

They were repulsed, but the garrison lost one officer and eleven men killed, five officers and 38 men wounded, 60 men missing.

BOER COMMANDANT KILLED. The Boer Commandant Offerman and 19 men are known to have been killed.

SHOT FOR A BEAR. ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Sept. 30.—(Special).—Daniel McNinch while shooting in the woods was mistaken for a bear by John Dinsmore and shot through the shoulder. A dangerous wound was inflicted.

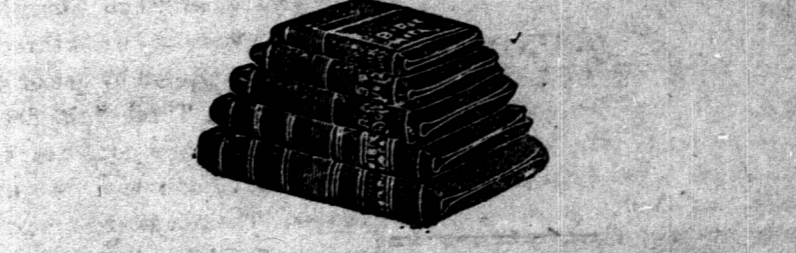
