TORONTO, Nov. 12 (CP)—Sensational scuffling by rookie Frank McCool and a typical scoring outburst by the Bodnar-Schirmer-Carr forward line gave Toronto a 3-1 victory last night over Montreal Canadiens before 14,839 fans. It was the sixth triumph in as many starts for the Leafs who heightened their national hockey league lead to four points over the second-place Canadiens.

McCool was particularly outstanding of the season when Buddy Cahan completely dominated the play and kept the puck in Toronto territory much of the time. He was kicking out short range shots so successfully that the fans were beginning to talk about his first shutout of the season when Buddy O'Connor, assisted by Dutch Hiller, finally blanked the Leafs in the Toronto nets with less than three minutes to go.
