At the Baptist Church last Sunday evening, Pastor White spoke on what he termed the "call of the Church to the world," using the words of Moses to Hobab—"Come thou with us and we will do thee good for the Lord hath spoken good concerning Israel." (2) All gospel invitations are personal: "Come thou;" Jesus and Moses spoke to individuals. We are all too general in our invitations; we should go in person to our friends who are not saved. (3) All gospel invitations demand a definite response. "Come now," come at once, come tonight. Delays are dangerous. "Come with us," to Jesus as Saviour and Lord—come to His word for counsel and guidance. The Bible is a sure guide—"a light to our feet and a lamp to our path—Come with us to the place of public worship. Man is a spirit, and that spirit man find rest only in God. In the act of public worship God meets his people more abundantly than in any form of private devotion. "The Lord loveth the gates of Zion better than all the dwellings of Jacob." God is honored most in the public worship of His Saints. Hence the command: "Forsake not the assembly of yourselves together." The man who lifts up his soul to God in devout public worship on the first day of the week, will find himself strong to resist the tempter during the remaining six days. "Come thou with us," to the home of God above. Glorious home, miss it not. Let there be the glad response of faith, simple trust, in God, and a joyful acceptance of the gospel's call—the call of God, of Christ, of the Spirit, of the Church, and of the individual Christian—"Come thou with us and we will do thee good, for the Lord hath spoken good concerning Israel.

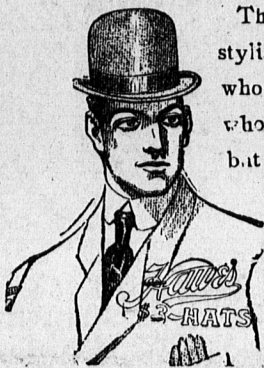

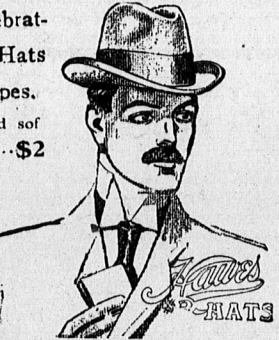
