Creamery and Cheese Courses have been held yearly since the inception of the school but this is the first year that a Farm Dairy Course has been held. The Farm Dairy Course is one that should commend itself to every farm boy and girl in the Maritime Provinces. Six students, including two ladies from Prince Edward Island, one lady from Halifax Co., N. S., and a lady from Kings Co., N. B., one gentleman from Prince Edward Island, and a gentleman from Western Nova Scotia availed themselves of the privileges of this class. Seven young men attended the Creamery Course, including one from P. E. Island and six from New Brunswick. Dr. Pethick, V. S., of Antigonish, delivered several instructive addresses before the classes and quite a number of the representatives of the dairy men of Sussex, who availed themselves of the opportunity to hear him, on the diseases and troubles of the dairy cow with which every dairyman has some time or other to contend. The cheese course, as already stated, opens on Wednesday, March 25th, with the promise of a pretty fair attendance. Messrs. McDougall, Daigle and Mr. Morrow, Dairy Superintendent for Prince Edward Island, will be the instructors.
