Chicago Again In the Limelight

City Practically Bankrupt And In Darkness, Now Faces Threatened Spread Of Disease —Much Alarm Felt.

(Special to the Guardian) CHICAGO, April 26.—Effects of Chicago's widely heralded bankruptcy still lingered on tonight in a doleful melange of lightless streets, refuse choked alleys and payless school teachers.

The reported entry of the notorious "Scarface" Al Capone in a big way into the City's politics did not tend to make the situation any more cheerful. Miles of streets were pitch dark except for automobile headlights and porch lamps of apprehensive citizens. The street lighting bureau said that 12,000 street fixtures were out of order because funds were not forthcoming to maintain the system. In the alleys of the streets refuse in some districts had not been collected since the first of the year. Trash and garbage accumulated in ever growing piles. Health authorities said they were alarmed at the prospect of the spread of disease. The school teachers accustomed to going payless during the trying days of January and February when the city treasury was flat, missed another pay day. They have \$4,425,000 coming to them, but they won't get it until May 7 and then from funds subscribed by a citizens rescue committee.

Unemployment Situation Is Serious In U. S.

(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, April 26.—Despite the customary increase of out of door jobs in April, unemployment in union labor circles has decreased only 1 per cent this month under last and President William Green of the American Federation of Labor, regards the situation as still serious. He said today reports reaching the A. F. of L. from all parts of the country show twenty percent of union wage earners still are without work. Taking up the employment situation in cities, Green said the number of jobs increased in April in only five cities, while thirteen showed decreases. Unemployment was said to be particularly acute in Detroit, Buffalo, Denver, Paterson, Jersey City, Chicago and New York.

Drayton Before U.S. Commission

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26.—Sir Henry L. Drayton, chairman of the Ontario Liquor Control Board, spent three hours before the House Judiciary Committee relating how government supervision of intoxicants in his province had remedied such conditions as have been described to the committee, as obtaining in this country under prohibition. Sir Henry declared that Ontario, the driest of the Canadian provinces, once had prohibition but had abandoned it for liquor control only after a "new and undesirable class of capitalists" had grown up. The change, he declared, had put the big boot-legger out of business, thus removing the element of avarice from the temperance problem, and now the Government was co-operating with the social worker further to remove the question of appetite from the equation. Sir Henry made no direct reference whatever to the dry laws of the United States, but his testimony was the final argument presented to the House Committee for a repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment or a change to some form of Government control. Sir Henry made no recommendations to the committee as to what it should do. He only presented a picture of the Government sales system in Ontario, which, he said, was

Solution Of U.S. Social Problems Not Up To Canada

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 26.—"A solution of the social problems of the United States is not up to Canada." Thus Dr. Clarence Cook Little, ex-president of the University of Michigan and formerly one of the leading educational authorities of the Middle Western States, branded measures taken by the King Government to prevent the export of liquor across the border as unnecessary. "As a friendly act of one Government to another the anti-export bill was a gallant gesture," he said. "However, as far as I can see there has been no prohibition in the United States, or should I say, the United States has never been dry. It is not up to Canada to help the United States enforce their social legislation. If we wished to prevent the import of—well, beans, it would be up to us to do so. The two instances are parallel."

Death Climaxed Wedding Party

(Special to the Guardian) TRENTON, N. J., April 26.—Death climaxed a gay wedding party here tonight. Ulrich Dahlgren, Jr., 20, son of a professor of biology of Princeton University, was killed, and his wife, Catherine, 25, was gravely injured, when the automobile in which they were pursuing the bridal couple was struck by a Pennsylvania train at a grade crossing. Alberta Election Next June 19th.

EDMONTON, Alta., April 26.—Rumors of a provincial election in Alberta current during the recent session of the legislature were confirmed today. Hon. George Hooley acting Premier officially announced that the United Farmers of Alberta government under the leadership of Hon. J. F. Brownlee, would seek a new mandate from the electors on June 19. Acquisition of the natural resources by the Province, marking a new era, and settlement of other major issues, present fresh administrative problems, which Premier Brownlee and his colleagues believe should have the sanction of the electors.



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
